Private Enterprise.

Recognizing the fact that Brevard has voted all the tax for street improvement that her property values will stand, also recognizing that a good street—good in all kinds of weather—from the depot to Main street is a necessity, the following subscriptions, amounting in the aggregate to over \$500, have been received.

Where is there another town which, after voting all the bonds that property values will stand, would voluntarily reach in its own pocket and furnish the money to extend the work which its bonds failed to produce in sufficient quantity? There are many instances where private enterprise has made for the betterment of all Brevard citizens: Our water supply and sewerage were the result of private enterprise, and they have been transferred to the town at actual cost. The court house and county lot was fenced by private subscriptions, and the first work done in an effort to open Broad street was paid for by private donations.
