MRS. MELINDA R. OWEN

Melinda Reed Owen was born August 27, 1830, and entered into rest July 20, 1915, the time of her earthly pilgrimage being eighty-four years ten months and twenty-three days. She professed faith in Jesus Christ at the age of fourteen and joined the Baptist church, of which she remained a faithful and consistent member till the time of her death. During this period of seventy-five years she was never supposed to have neglected any duty assigned to her, or to have done anything that was out of harmony with her profession.

At the age of sixteen she was married to John B. Owen, with whom she lived in wedlock for fifty-three years. Of this union there were born thirteen children, eleven of whom grew up, married, and became parents; two died in infancy. Her husband died sixteen years ago. She is survived by four sons, three daughters, eighty grandchildren and the same number of great-grandchildren. For fifty-three years she lived with her husband at the same country home. Since his death she has lived with different ones of her children. While the home of Mrs. Reedlove was designated as her home, there was a friendly rivalry as to who should have the privilege of her presence in the home.

She could not be persuaded to be idle. She finished a present she had been knitting for a member of the family at sundown on Saturday evening. She entered into rest just before sunset the following day. She finished her work and then without a struggle entered into rest. Her body was laid to rest by the side of that of her husband on the beautiful little hill overlooking the old home.

The following is an outline of the address given at the grave by her youngest son, Rev. Jesse C. Owen:

"I feel that I must speak a few words of grateful testimony to the beautiful, unselfish and helpful life of my mother. Her life next to that of my Saviour, has always been my most perfect ideal and my highest inspiration. The memories which center in her life are my most prized and cherished possession. I cannot here attempt to name the chief characteristics of her life: First, she was a good wife and mother. In industry, economy, patience, unselfish devotion, forbearance and gentleness she measured up to the full stature of a good wife. Her words—her words cannot say what I think what a good wife should be—she was that. As a mother, she was tender and kind, but firm. We know she would do just what she said. In her life she was the example. Every child she reared is beloved in her heart. In her advice and teaching she was wise. No child ever cried, or rebelled, or complained.

"She was a good neighbor. Not only can we say that no one ever complained to her to yield, but she sought out those in need and rendered assistance in such a helpful way as to leave every one feeling comfortable. Travellers of all classes found a home and welcome under her roof. In the truest sense it may be said of her:

"She lived under men's hands and in the way,
And was a friend to man."

"She was a good Christian in the truest sense of the term. For more than seventy years she was a faithful member of the church. With little education in the schools, she had a marvelous grasp of the great fundamental truths of the Bible. In these twenty-five years of contact with the schools and with the thought and life of several nations, my religious beliefs have undergone no material change from what they were as received at mother's knee. In her life she was what we think a Christian should be. As little children we believed she was sacred and in this end would have a home in heaven. And now at the end, though no one was present at the last moment for a final word, we are sure that our mother is at home with God. So we sorrow not as those who have no hope.

I am sure she would say to all, give your life to God early. Be true always in every relation to God and your fellowmen. Do faithfully every duty assigned by the hand of God, and you will make this world brighter and better, and


