**BLUE A TAR HEEL**

Surgeon-General Blue, who was recently elected president of the American Medical Association, is a North Carolinian. His many friends and relatives in this section of the country feel proud and honored that such a very high compliment should come to one of her distinguished sons. To be elected president of the American Medical Association is the greatest compliment that can go to any member of the medical profession in the United States. Possibly the writer may be excused if he says by way of comparison that to be president of this great scientific body of men easily places him at the head of all professional gentlemen in this country, and possibly those who speak the English language. General Blue was born in Richmond County, North Carolina, in 1868. He graduated at the University of Maryland in 1892. He was commissioned Surgeon-General by President Taft January 13, 1912. This appointment was won by noteworthy and meritorious service especially evidenced in the suppression and eradication of bubonic plague in 1907. This work brought him instantly into such prominence that his fitness for the position of Surgeon-General could not but be recognized. A few years ago Dr. Blue spent some time in Europe studying preventive medicine as practiced there, and in 1910 graduated from the London School of Tropical Medicine. In May of the same year he was detailed to represent the P. H. and M. H. S. at the Congress on Medicine and Hygiene at Buenos Aires and while there took advantage of the opportunity to study possible routes by which plague and yellow fever might be brought into the United States from South America. Dr. Blue is a delightful companion. He is wonderfully fitted in conversation, well informed, delightful to listen to and his personality and style are unusually attractive.
