CONTENT FOR LAW

In discussing the lack of reverence for the laws of the land on the part of the people Rev. H. B. Bernard, of Atlanta, Ga., declares in the current issue of The Home Field that a measure of blame attaches to the preachers and teachers for their neglect in preaching occasional sermons in which dignity and respect for law is taught.

"Our people as a whole seem to be wanting in knowledge and appreciation of the dignity and majesty of the law," says Rev. Bernard. "Something is fundamentally wrong somewhere. Who is to blame? Perhaps every class of our citizens. Without wishing to appear as an accuser of the brethren, I nevertheless raise the question as to a measure of blame attaching to our preachers and teachers. I have no doubt that our preachers must be brought in as guilty of neglect in the matter.

"Reader, when did you hear a sermon on the dignity of the law? How many such sermons have you heard in the past ten or twenty years? Honest now, what have you heard from our pulpits or from our schools and colleges? Whatever has come to the people has come incidentally. So far as this scribe has observed, no special efforts

have been made to ground the people in the doctrine of the law. Our people, as a whole, do not know anything about the sin involved in a violation of the law.

"Is it not time that our preachers and teachers bestir themselves in an effort to let the people know the truth? The Bible is full of texts that can be used with profit. The laws of nature, which are God's laws, cannot be violated without speedy and painful results. There is no escape. Ought not to be any. God loves us too much to let us off. My people are destroyed for lack of knowledge. Our remedy, at least to begin with, is to teach all the people by line upon line and precept upon precept that law is of God and cannot be violated without sin and sin cannot go unpunished. Let all the truths as to reverence for law be driven home upon the conscience of the people.

SOME LIKED IT

Tigers must be getting numerous in Brevard. The News tells of one with headquarters on top of the court house which passed the good stuff down a rope with loopholes in it. We want Brother Jones to tell us if this is an effective way to prolong the tourist season, a subject in which all mountain towns are now keenly interested - Western Carolina Democrat.

SHOULD PROVIDE CHEMICALS

I would suggest that our chief be furnished with half a dozen knapsack chemical fire extinguishers. Any one in a passing automobile will gladly take one of our firemen to a house on fire and our fire chief has one of his own. By thus being "Johnny on the spot" at the beginning of the fire the services of the cumbersome hose cart will in most cases be entirely dispensed with.

A few years ago the writer was able to prevent what might have been a serious fire with one of these knapsack fire extinguishers. An oil heater had been overturned in a bed room and the whole floor was in a blaze. In one minute the flames were extinguished by the knapsack fire extinguisher.

SOUTHERN RAILWAY NEW TRADE MARK



The Southern Railway Company has adopted a new and attractive trade mark as shown above. The design "SR" is symbolical to the name of the road and the wording "The Southern Serves the South" is suggestive of the many lines operated by the Southern Railway throughout all of the states south of the Ohio and Potomac and east of the Mississippi rivers.

There is hardly a city or town of importance throughout the entire south that is not connected with the balance of the south, either directly by the Southern Railway's own trains or by sleeping car lines over other roads in connection with Southern Railway, via some adjacent junction point. On this account the title "The Southern Serves the South" was adopted as being appropriate.

Southern Railway spends about \$200,000 a year in advertising and a great deal of this advertising is done in the northern, eastern and western sections of the country so as to attract people into the south, and on all this advertising matter this trade mark will appear hereafter.

JURY FINDS NO EVIDENCE

The report of the Cobb County, Ga., grand jury was presented in court last week at Marietta, and as expected by everybody, it found no facts sufficient to indict anyone for taking part in the mob that kidnaped Leo M. Frank from the state prison farm and hanged him to a tree near Marietta.

The jury declared in its report that it had found several clues, but that it was unable to connect anyone with the crime. About thirty-five witnesses were examined and a number of letters, both anonymous and signed, were considered.

The report of the jury was all that was expected and probably meets the approval of a large number of people in Georgia. Probably the things which lynched Frank will never be known, and the name of Georgia will be smeared for all time.

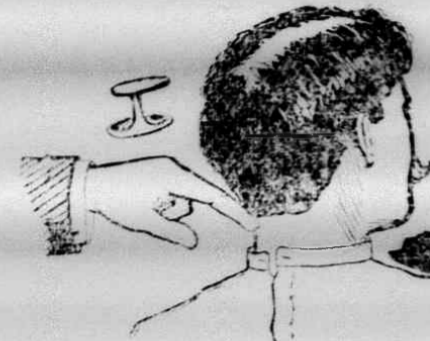
