Stale Bread or Fresh Bread.

Most persons don't like stale bread so well as fresh, though many consider it more digestible. As a matter of fact, fresh bread is just as digestible as stale, if it be chewed as much, but its very softness is a temptation to chew it too little; hence it is swallowed without the admixture of enough saliva to digest its starch. Stale bread, on the other hand, is difficult to swallow unless thoroughly chewed. The difference between fresh and stale bread is merely a matter of water. In bread as it comes from the oven the crust is dry and crisp and the crumb is moist and soft, because all the water is in the crumb. As hours or days pass the crust absorbs water from the crumb and becomes soft, while the crumb becomes dry. A loaf can be made fresh again by slightly moistening it and placing it for a few minutes in a hot oven. The heat drives the water from the crust back into the crumb.

Curious Army Toast.

Of all the British regiments the Welsh fusiliers have the most curious army toast. It forms part of the ceremony of the grand dinner given annually on St. David's day. After the dinner the drum major, accompanied by the goat, the mascot of the fusiliers, bedecked with rosettes of red and blue ribbon, marches around the table, carrying a plate of loaves. Every officer or guest who has never eaten one before is obliged to do so, standing on his chair with one foot on the table, while the drummers beat a roll behind his chair. He is then considered a true Welshman. All the toasts are coupled with the name of St. David. It is much the same way that the toast with Highland honors is drunk. Each guest stands with one foot on his chair and one on the table, and the pipers, piping, parade the room.

Sikhism.

The Sikhs are a religious sect, not a race. No man is born a Sikh; he becomes one by the ceremony known as the "pahal," or baptism of the sword, which is delayed until the candidate has reached years of discretion. After this ceremony every Sikh adds "Singh" to his original name. Sikhism, when founded in the fifteenth century, was a blending of the best features of the Hindu and Mohammedan religions, but was a monotheistic sect and a peaceful one; but Mohammedan persecution transformed the Sikhs into a military and religious commonwealth. As regards prohibitions, Sikhism is one of considerable austerity; the greater part of its adherents are bound to abstain from tobacco and wine, though only very orthodox Sikhs observe the latter prohibition.
