

WHITE STAR LINER CYMRIC TORPEDOED BY A SUBMARINE

SAILED FROM NEW YORK WITH
ENORMOUS CARGO OF
MUNITIONS.

NO AMERICANS ON BOARD

Carried No Passengers.—Crew of 110
Men.—Within Day's Journey of
Her Destination.

London.—The 13,000-ton White Star liner Cymric, which for some time has been torpedoed by a German submarine according to advices received here. One report says that the Cymric was attacked in the Atlantic and the information of the White Star Company at Liverpool is that the steamer was torpedoed about noon.

The Cymric left New York April 23 with an enormous cargo of war munitions. As she usually makes the voyage from New York to Liverpool in 10 days she was, therefore, within a day or two of her destination. It is considered probable, in the absence of definite details, that the disaster to the Cymric occurred on the west coast of Ireland.

The fate of the steamship is not yet known, although early messages received in London reported that the Cymric was sinking. The crew aboard numbered about 130 men, but the steamer carried no passengers.

The Cymric left New York April 23, with a cargo of munitions and war supplies including 8,000 cases of cartridges and was due in Liverpool Monday. She was commanded by Capt. F. E. Beadell and had a crew of over 100 men. The Cymric carried no passengers and was not armed.

J. J. McPherson, British Vice Consul here in Chicago, of shipping, said that as far as he knew there were no Americans among the crew. The Cymric, he said, arrived here with a crew of 110 men. Twelve deserted and eight were taken on. In addition to the crew, five distressed British seamen, who had been ill here were on the steamer.

The manifest of the Cymric discloses that she had on board 101 cases of rifles and other firearms; 590 cases of primers; 1,412 cases of empty shells; 8,000 cases of cartridges; in cases, of parts of aeroplanes; 400 rods of barbed wire; 81 cases of tractors and parts; 20 cases of gun parts; six cases of bayonets; 220 cases of fuse and 7,720 cases of fuses.

CARRANZA CAN'T PROTECT US, SAYS SENATOR BORAH

Urges That Additional Troops Be Ordered to Mexico at Once.

Washington.—General Funston has repeatedly urged that his forces be strengthened. The question of calling out a portion of the National Guard is not under immediate consideration, however, and as the only other means of adding materially to the border guard would be to employ coast artillery troops as infantry if there is nothing to indicate that General Funston's force is to be increased.

Senator Borah issued a statement urging that additional troops be ordered to the border and that any man or party in Mexico which sought to embarrass the task of protecting American interests be treated as enemies of the country. "It must be apparent to any one at all familiar with the situation," said the Senator, "that Carranza cannot restore order in Mexico; he cannot establish a government and what concerns us most, he cannot protect the border."

Secretary Lansing declined to say what steps were being taken to investigate intimations that the inspiration for the Columbus raid or the Glenn Springs raids had come from the American side of the border. To make any announcement, he said merely would serve to block the investigators.

FOUR MORE LEADERS OF IRISH REVOLT SHOT.

London.—Four more of the leaders of the Irish revolt have been sentenced to death by the Dublin court martial and executed, according to an official statement. They were Cornelius Colbert, Edmund Kent, Michael Mallon and J. J. Hevston. Nineteen others concerned in the insurrection were sentenced to death but the sentence was commuted to various terms of penal servitude. Two others were acquitted.

Want More Troops on Border.

San Antonio, Tex.—Army officers here are hopeful that the Glenn Springs raid will serve to arouse the War Department to the pressing need of additional troops for border patrol duty. The nine soldiers attacked at Glenn Springs belong to the Fourteenth Cavalry that has been patrolling a stretch of nearly 400 miles of the wildest country along the Mexican border. Troops and detachments of the regiment are spread out from Laredo almost to Sierra Blanca.

BALSAM GROVE DROPS

The Jackson County Journal correspondent at Balsam Grove writes as follows, which will be of interest to New readers in that section:

"The little community up here in the mountains is building fast in some ways and some ways slow. One particular thing that has been neglected at Balsam Grove is the Balsam Grove school house. The writer visited the school house last week. I am sorry to report the condition of the Balsam Grove school house. I counted eighteen window panes broken out and about forty teen desks broken. The few desks that remain unbroken are carved up so badly that they look like they had been used fifty years. The

main building was covered with Coe-tright shingles a few weeks ago, but the old roof was neglected and stayed on so long that the rain came through and ruined the overhead ceiling. Quite a lot of the ceiling has swollen and fallen down. The locks on the doors are all broken, the doors are open all the time. Just a few years ago there was a nice library placed in the school house. As best I remember there were about one hundred nice books in it. I thought as I was counting the broken desks and windows I would see how many library books were left. I found only one book and a few leaves of another. Then I looked around on the wall where not many months ago many beautiful pictures were tacked up. I saw a few looking fairly well; some out and torn up. I saw a few scattered over the floor. Who did this I do not know; it was not all done at one time. It seems as if someone has been using the school house as a target. I noticed where they had shot through many window panes. While looking and thinking over the affairs of the school building, I thought many, many times of the hard work Profs. Robt. L. Madison and S. Jerome Phillips had done in helping to build that school house, and then for it to be used as a target! The Balsam Grove school house was once the finest and most up-to-date public school building in Jackson county; but if it is treated as badly in the next two years as it has been treated in the past, there will be no desks nor windows left, and not much house.

"Two of Jackson's business men, and one of Jackson's biggest men—Abe Moore and Phillip Morgan—have bought quite a lot of timber on upper Canev Fork. They have been logging the timber and will open their sawmill up here this week. They are doing quite a lot of work on the Chestnut creek road so they can move their sawmill out near the head of the creek, about two and a half miles from the Old Bald mountain. They also hauled from Balsam Grove to Sylva a car load of fine walnut logs during the past two weeks.

BREVARD HARDWARE CO. TO ENLARGE ITS STORE

Carpenters Begin Next Week to Double Capacity of Brevard Hardware Company's Home; New Hardware Lines to be Added.

C. M. Doyle announces that carpenters will begin alterations within the next few days on the home of the Brevard Hardware company resulting in the doubling of the capacity of the store room and providing more commodious and up-to-date quarters to accommodate the installation of several contemplated lines of hardware.

Architect E. H. Norwood has pre-

pared the plans for the work to be done by the Pickelsimer estate. The present hardware quarters and the adjoining room formerly used as a restaurant will be converted into one large store room 40x70.

The steps leading to the second story of the building will be remodeled so as to lead up from the center of the big store front, the ascent to begin after an 8 foot drop from the front. On either side will be 14 feet plate glass fronts with prism glass 10 feet high on top. In the lobby between the steps and the street will be entrances on either side to the store.

The floors of the two buildings will be taken out and dropped to the level of the street. The upper story will be remodeled for office purposes.

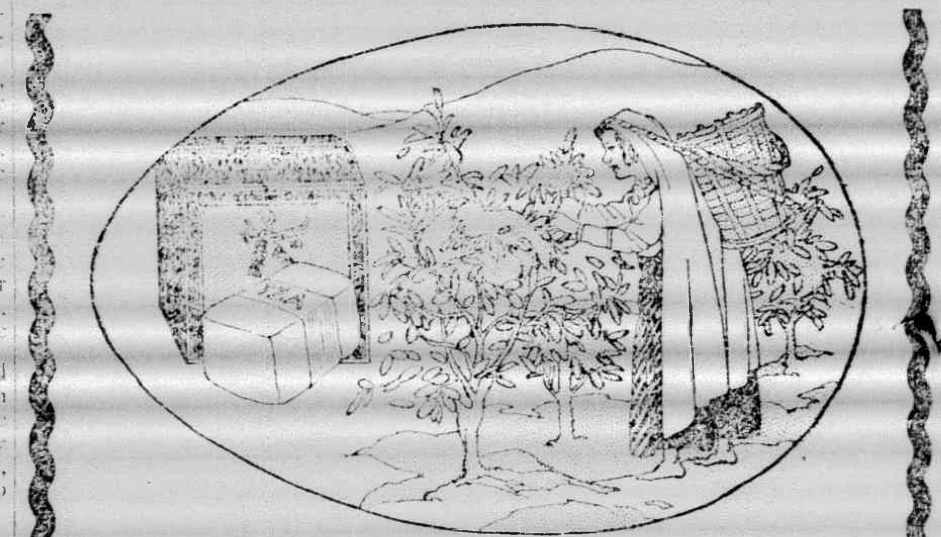
Mr. Doyle states that alterations will be completed by July, after which he will stock up with several lines of hardware he has not been selling.
