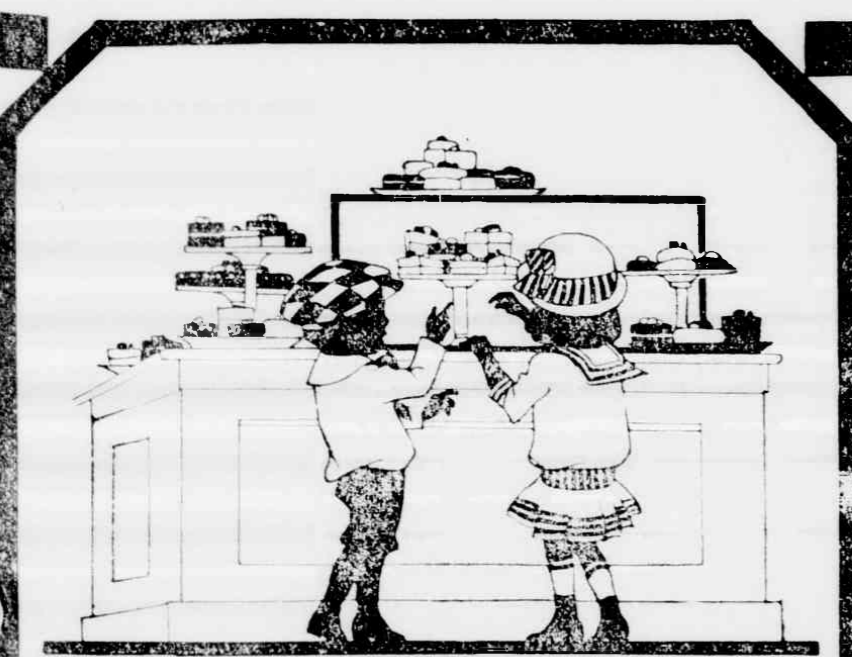
Statistics of Blindness.

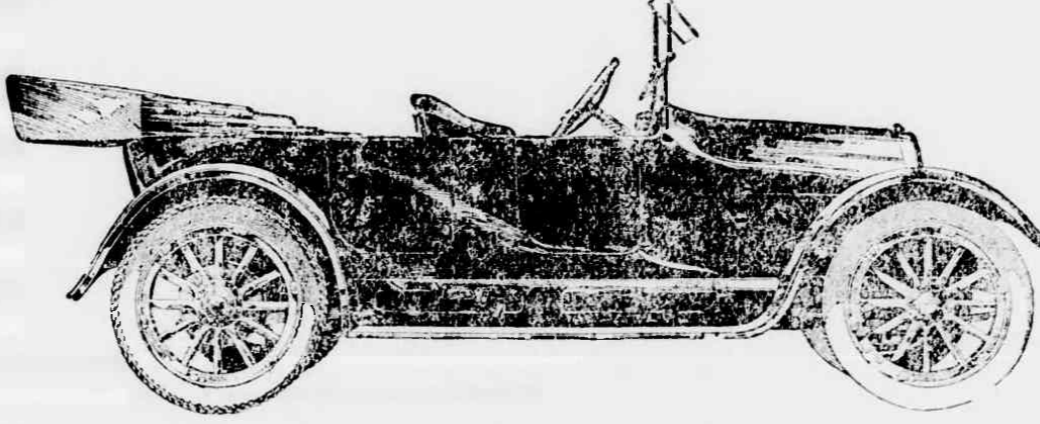

ZACHARY GIVEN TWO YEARS

In District court Wood Zachary was sentenced to two years in the Atlanta penitentiary for blockading. The charge against Zachary of assaulting revenue officers was not tried. United States Attorney W. C. Hammer said that he had an indictment against Zachary and a defendant now in Atlanta prison in connection with the wounding of J. A. Galloway and another officer last Thanksgiving day and that it was undesirable to try the cases separately. Mr. Hammer therefore asked for the maximum penalty against Zachary in the revenue case.

In addressing the court in regard to the assault made on Mr. Galloway a year ago, Attorney Hammer stated that no officer in the service has a better record for fearlessness and efficiency than Galloway. That officer lost one eye from wounds received when fired on from an ambush in the Canada section of Jacksonville in November 1915.—Asheville Times.

OAK GROVE FOR TEMPERANCE

At the close of the Sunday school at Oak Grove Baptist church near Quebec a brief temperance program was rendered. A collection was taken for "The Lincoln Lee Legion," the abstinence department of the Anti Saloon League, to help in the campaign for nation-wide prohibition. At the close of the program twenty-five signed the pledge: "Whereas, the use of intoxicating liquors as a beverage is productive of pauperism, degradation and crime, and believing it is our duty to discourage that which produces more evil than good, we therefore pledge ourselves to abstain from the use of intoxicating liquors as a beverage."

MRS. F. D. CLEMENT DEAD; HIGH TRIBUTE PAID DECEASED

Mrs. Frank D. Clement, born February 19, 1873, whose death on Wednesday of last week was announced in the News, was Miss Blanche R. Dodge before her marriage to Mr. Clement on December 6, 1894. Three sons were born to them—Ralph, Verne and Theodore—all of whom live in Brevard, where the family has lived since coming here in 1912.

Mrs. Clement had been in declining health for some time and she spent the past winter in Florida in the hope of finding permanent improvement but despite all change of location and medical skill could do the end came as a result of the hardening of the arteries.

In addition to her husband and three sons, the deceased is survived by two sisters and a brother.

Rev. W. E. Poovey, who conducted the funeral services from the home on last Thursday afternoon, paid high tribute to the estimable qualities of the deceased, saying that while she had not in Brevard had the church of her choice, the Congregationalist, she had affiliated herself with Christian endeavors in Brevard in a way that counted for good.

Following the services the remains were accompanied to Washington by Mr. Clement for cremation. Mr. Clement returned on Saturday.

Oil-Proof Cement.

A cement which will not be affected by oil is made by mixing glycerine and litharge to the consistency of a thick paste. This will be found very handy in repairing cracked oil reservoirs or in making an outlight joint between two metal plates. The cement should be applied as soon as it is mixed, since it hardens very quickly.
