WASHINGTON LETTER.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Feb. 23rd '95.

When the Senate meets at 11 o'clock to day it will not adjourn again until the clock shows the hour of noon next Monday. To-day the navy bill will be discussed, and between now and the final adjournment there will be a number of recesses, but they will not be of long duration. The Senate will be in session tomorrow, but unless there is a prolonged talk upon the navy bill only conference reports will be considered.

The appropriation bills are being rushed through with all possible dispatch. The appropriation of this Congress will approximate a total of one billion dollars. "This is a billion dollar country" as Tom Reed said four years ago, and its necessities and expenditures necessarily increase.

Senator Ransom's friends continue to speak in the most gratified terms of his appointment to the Mexican Mission. His fitness for the place is conceded by every one. He is superbly equipped for the position. He tells me the climate is in every way desirable, the high table lands around the Capital of the Montezuma being more elevated than the plateaus in the piedmont sections of North Carolina. It is a healthy place and as the new Minister will take Mrs. Ransom, Miss Ransom and one of his sons with him, he will have a pleasant time during his two years service in a foreign country.

I have been much amazed at the way some of the Northern and Western papers speak of him as "aged". He is one of the "youngest" men in our delegation! No one to see him would ever connect him with the infirmities of old age. He is erect, alert, and his wide experience with men and affairs is all that suggests the sixty-eight years spent on this earth. His vast influence in the Senate, and his popularity among his colleagues is what secured this appointment for him.

The future alignment of political parties is giving all thoughtful people much concern. In the next campaign there will be three parties on the field. The question of finance will be the leading issue and "silver" will be the slogan of what promises now to be the strongest party. Bimetallism will sweep the South and West unless all signs fail, and the present outlook is greatly changed. If a tide of unprecedented prosperity were to sweep over the country the old, rival parties, democratic and republican, might meet in solid phalanx and fight it out once more, but there is no prospect of such a tidal wave of prosperity as will make this probable.

The House has positively refused to take up the Williams vs Settle contested election case. There is no time to "consider" it further. A year and a half ago, the case could have been settled by straight methods. A man cannot afford to finess forever unless he holds a "straight flush" or three aces at least. I use this venacular because it will be readily understood by every one connected with the case except Hon. Frederick Woodard and some of the attorneys, Judge Graham for example.

The appointment of Hon. Wm. L. Wilson of West Virginia to be Postmaster General is well received here. Mr. Bissell retires because of pressing business duties and to the sincere regret of the President who esteems him most highly. Postmaster General Wilson was offered everything in sight by the President and choose the portfolio of the Post office Department as it rank in the other positions and kept him in his home. He is an alumnus of Columbian University, a prominent Baptist, and he leader of the tariff reform movement in this country.

A Virginia jury took a few minutes to render a verdict of "guilty" in the case of the Aquia Creek train robbers. A Washington jury determined as many days before it pronounced the northern fugitive for justice, Capt. Howgate "in open"!
