UNION MEETING.

Last Thursday we started to the great gathering of this body of the Baptist host appointed to meet with the church at magnolia in Cumberland county and our objective point on the railroad was Sweden of the C. F. & Y. V.

Having reached there, we found a brother who was expecting us, standing near a fine horse and buggy not far from the depot. "Are you looking for anybody?" we asked. "Yes," was the reply, "looking for you," and mounting with him, we were soon trotting over the sandy roads, with rapid pace, towards the place of meeting.

The union assembled next morning as the messengers from the various churches began to come up from all parts of the bounds of the South River Association, and soon the large house was filled. The genial and kindly speaking "moderator" who never fails to attend these quarterly assemblies of his brethren, was on hand and in due time to extend the hand of greeting to all.

Bro. Ish m Royal, in this regard, is an example to all the union meetings of the Association. His presence we may always rely on to cheer and counsel the brethren in their work for Christ. The Missionary sermon was preached by the writer on request of the committee on religious exercises; and we also had an excellent discourse from Rev. Bro. Naylor on the greatness of the work of missions in our bounds and in all lands beyond.

The interest in the meeting was enhanced by the presence of the young editor of the N. C. Baptist, Bro. John A. Oates Jr., whose well delivered address and pungent words of truth against the liquor traffic, the great curse of our land, moved the whole body of hearers that eagerly hung upon his words. It was a treat to hear him throw the hot "shot" among those of all the Christians of every name, who vote for men who drink liquor. It was a high indictment against them, but it was a true bill nevertheless.

On Sunday news had been rumor ed around that the Rev. Dr. C. Durham from Raleigh would be there, coming across the country from the Cedar Creek Union meeting, and a large crowd assembled in the church awaiting his coming, in anxious expectation, and about 11 o'clock he drove up being brought over by a brother from the District Union. He was at once invited to enter the pulpit. Perfectly self possessed and quiet in manner, Dr. Durham read from the Epistle to the Romans, and the 8th Chapter, pausing at the 18th verse as his text in these words "For I reckon that the sufferings of this are not worthy" etc, etc.

His discourse was a masterly effort; earnest, tender, full of inspiring faith to the Christian and wonderfully lucid and clear to the plainest comprehension of all; and the close attention of the packed audience was riveted upon him in evidence that the words spoken by him were received into honest hearts.

That sermon of the noble preacher will be remembered when the speaker who delivered it will be no more on earth.

The Roseboro effort to build a church was considered at the union and money raised by cash and subscriptions for that purpose. A hat collection was also taken on Sunday for the new church about to be built in the Lee settlement, about 10 miles from Dunn, on land already donated by Bro. Marshal Lee and sister Winifred Barefoot. A very desirable locality for a church which work has been fostered by the Executive Board of the South River Association through the Missionaries employed by them, the present writer being the preacher at that point at this time, every 4th Sunday in each month.
