-We have heard from the "enterprise" mentioned in this paper a few weeks ago. It is still doing business at the same old stand.

-The farmers say that "Gen. Green" has about captured their farms, and unless they can get sufficient help their crops will suffer.

-It is stated that the Cape Fear rose 10 feet in one hour during the heavy rains last week. The statement is vouchsafed for.

-Now, gentlemen," said the professor, "name some of the beauties of education." And a facetious student in the back row shouted: "Pretty school teachers!"

-Mr. Harry Jordan has accepted a position with Mr. C. L. Wilson and has charge of the cold drink department. He will keep the boys cool and pitch ball.

-Those attending the commencement at Buie's Creek last Thursday found it difficult to cross the streams along the roads. We have heard of no accident thus far.

-Hon. D. H. McLean has been invited and has accepted the invitation to deliver an address at Siler City July 4th. Those who attend may expect to be highly entertained.

-The 'Phone lines have been out of fix this week on account of putting in lightning arresters which will give the much desired protection which our people want.

-The bridge at Fayetteville was reported burned last week but it is not true. It was thought one time it would be necessary in order to save the steel bridge just below it.

-The school taught by Miss Emma Young will give an exercise at the Planter's Warehouse next Friday night, June 1st. The band will furnish music for the occasion. All are invited.

-The Cape Fear river was the highest last week ever known before. At Fayetteville it was more than three feet higher than the Populist fresher which was the highest known to the oldest inhabitants.

-It is said that the tallest man in the service of the United States Army comes from Cumberland county. He is 6 feet and 7 inches in his stocking feet. His name is John B. Melvin and is 25 years of age.

-The doctor said I ought to have change of climate," remarked the vacation-seeking wife. "That's lucky," replied the foxy husband. "I notice that the Weather Bureau predicts cold rain, followed by a hot, dry spell."

-We learn that the bridge company at work on the bridge at Lillington lost about \$700 worth of material in the high water last week. About 125 barrels of cement and several thousand feet of lumber were carried down the river.

-"Snooks" sent us a full report of Buie's Creek commencement yesterday, but it came after he had already put a condensed report of it in type. We regret we did not get it earlier for we appreciate his kindness in sending it.

-Farmers in the western part of the State are almost totally ruined from the effect of recent rains and high water. These wheat crops are totally lost. In McDowell county alone the loss is estimated at \$200,000. The loss in Harnett county along the Cape Fear has been considerable and is impossible to estimate just now.

-Mr. Ralph Kinlaw, of this place, was called to Fayetteville Monday night by telegram, his brother Mr. P. G. Kinlaw, a contractor, having fallen from the 2nd story of a building Monday evening. He was dangerously hurt but is still living.

-We are informed that all the bridges on the other side of Cape Fear river are gone, save one and that stands on lower Little River. All the bridges on Upper Little river are gone and only one is left between Fayetteville and Moore county.

-We notice that all the filth of the town is carried off in a Southwestern direction from the town, and it is not carried any great distance. As a rule the breeze in the summer comes from this direction and the people get the full benefit of the delightful(?) odor. Would it not be better to put the filth on the Northern side of town?

-The little six-months-old child of Mr. and Mrs. Ralph Kinlaw, of this place, died Sunday at 12 o'clock and was buried Monday evening at 2 o'clock, Rev. W. A. Forbes conducting the funeral services at the residence. Mr. and Mrs. Kinlaw have the sympathy of a host of friends.

-We have copy on file for a change in Gainey & Jordan's "ad" but owing to a rush of work are unable to make the change this week. You will find this firm always ready to extend every accommodation to their customers. They carry a well selected line of jewelry at all times.

-A game of ball has been arranged between Smithfield and Dunn to be played on the ground here next Thursday evening June 6th. Smithfield has some crack players and the game promises to be one of the best played here during the season. Smithfield has hired several good ball players and will bring a good battery.

-We are requested to announce that the commencement at Benson Academy, Benson, N. C., will take place Friday night June 7th. On account of the large crowd expected the mammoth tobacco warehouse just erected will be used. The programme will consist of plays, dialogues, declamations, recitations, songs, drills, etc.

-It has been suggested and we think it a good one, that we have an old time "road day" in Dunn and work the streets. On main street there are many holes four and five inches deep and it is dangerous to drive your horse out of a walk. We would also suggest that the crowd be divided up and have some of the side walks cleared off. The boxes, counters, barrels, etc., occupy much of the space needed by the public. This work should not be delayed and one man should be hired and paid to superintend the work—his name we will call "chief."

-On Thursday, May 24, while the Cape Fear river was at its highest there came down the river a circular saw mill complete. Mr. Z. T. Kivett who lives at McNeill's Ferry saw it, and with his boys went in pursuit and over took it at what is known as Big Island in Smyleys Falls. After several hours hard work they succeeded in landing the entire mill and fixtures on safe grounds. The peculiar part of it is that when captured the saw was running, slowly of course, caused by the current or swiftness of the water. The owner can get the mill back by paying the expense of capturing it.

-Monday was a busy day in courts of justice. One day last week a young man named Sam Wade sold Mr. Moseow Butler a cow which he butchered and offered for sale on the market. Mr. James Allen Norris missed his cow and came to Mr. Butler soon after the beef was dressed and asked permission to examine the hide, the marks, etc. He found it to be his cow, and a warrant was issued against Mr. Butler. The trial lasted all Monday afternoon concluding late that night. It was heard by Justices Creel and Shell, who gave a verdict of not guilty in behalf of Mr. Butler. The young man Wade had made good his escape before the trial. Six lawyers were employed in the case and it was one of much interest. The attorneys made able speeches which attracted at least two hundred spectators.

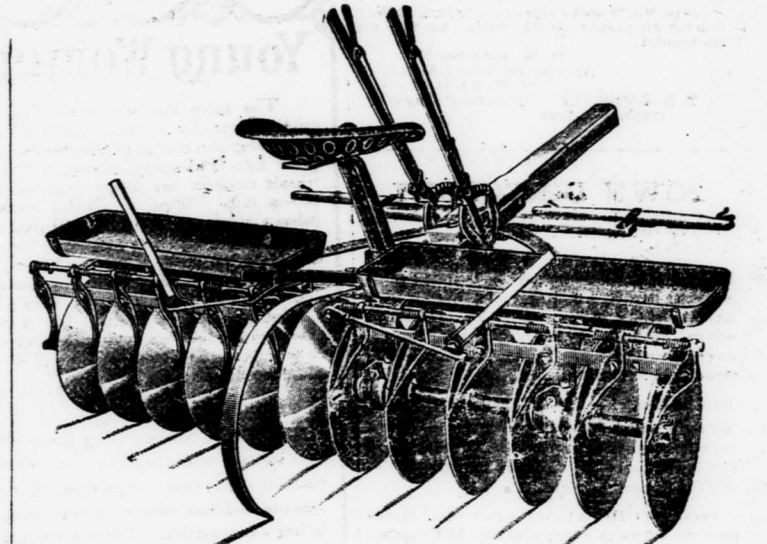
