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



The Atlanta News says that the Chinese reformers, who are working to modernize the empire, already have in their secret organization twenty-five millions of Chinamen, who are contributing systematically to the fund which sustains their propaganda. Cholera Cure For Hogs and Poultry.

The following will be of interest to our readers. It was taken first from the Farm Journal:

"Take two ounces pulverized capsicum; two ounces pulverized asafoetida; one ounce pulverized rhubarb; four ounces carbonate of iron; six ounces Spanish brown; two ounces flour of sulphur, mix thoroughly and put up in air tight packages or vessels, and keep for use.

"For hog cholera, pound half a pound in twenty quarts of meal or bran and feed twice a day until all symptoms of cholera disappear.

"For chickens, put one tablespoonful in two quarts of meal and feed twice a day until all symptoms of the disease disappear.

"A cure soon results with every fowl or hog that is able to swallow the remedy; but when a chicken will not eat, make a pill of the remedy about the size of a small pea and force it down the patient's throat into the crop and a cure will surely result. It is safe to repeat the dose two or three times a day.

Annexation of Cuba.

There is scarcely any doubt of the fact that the annexation sentiment in Cuba is growing very rapidly, and it is probably true, as stated by General Gomez, that after Cuba has been given a taste of freedom—in deference to the sentiment that has long possessed the people—she will be ready for annexation.

There seems no excuse, therefore, for any further talk of force or coercion, for it seems apparent that even stronger considerations are drawing us closer together.

Porto Rico is going to prove a valuable object lesson to Cuba, since the administration has, in response to public sentiment, withdrawn the objectionable 15 per cent tariff, and within the course of a year or two we may expect to see the latter desiring the same degree of prosperity through close trade relations with this country that Porto Rico is already beginning to enjoy.

Already the movement for Cuban reciprocity has been started, for the intelligence of the island fully understands that the country must depend upon the United States, mainly as the most satisfactory market for its sugar and tobacco. With the duty taken off of these products, or considerably lowered, Cuba would be benefited millions of dollars annually and a great impetus given to all lines of industry.

In the matter of tobacco it is well known that its consumption is increasing in proportion as the price is lowered, so that with the tariff off Cuba could expect to sell two or three times as much tobacco in this country as she now sells. It is plain to be seen, therefore, how the benefit of reciprocity of annexation must be peculiarly attractive to Cuba. Inducements, in fact, which she cannot long refuse to voluntarily take advantage of.
