Mr. S. J. Hooks, cotton buyer for Sprunt & Sons, says that his books show a difference in his receipts of 1706 bales, October 1st, 1900 and October 1st, 1901.

Editor J. P. Pittman is out with the sheriff this week on his rounds through the county collecting taxes. He will be glad to see all his delinquent subscribers.

Mrs. J. H. Pope moved into her new residence on the corner of Divine and McKay streets yesterday. It is a nice building and adds much to the appearance of that part of town.

The work on the two brick stores of Mr. J. E. Wilson is nearing completion and will soon be occupied. They are handsome stores and will add much to the appearance of the town.

Hood & Grantham's line of holiday goods and Xmas novelties this year will surpass any line ever before brought to Dunn. Mr. Grantham leaves Monday for Northern markets to finish buying their year's goods.

Rev. R. W. Hines filled his regular appointment at the Presbyterian church Sunday morning. He conducted a union service at the Methodist church Sunday night. He preached two excellent sermons.

Mr. F. P. Furless, cotton buyer for J. H. Sloan, of Wilmington, and Mr. W. T. Sellers, cotton buyer for Eure, Gregory & Co., of Norfolk, are on our market this season and these with the other buyers that we already have insure those who bring their cotton to our market to get the very best prices, as the local buyers will be in touch with the largest cotton merchants of this country.

The Crooks is an organization in our town composed of some of its most prominent young men, and is strictly a society club of mutual enjoyment. Each member has taken the oath of allegiance, and so far no one has broken any of the rules. This club is of a higher type than the Owl Club. The hours of meeting from 10 p. m. to 3 a. m.

In comparing the amount of cotton brought to our market last year up to Oct. 1st and this year up to Oct. 1st and the prices of the two seasons, we find a great difference. Last year the books showed that 2,856 bales had been sold, this year only 359. The price Oct. 1st, 1900 was 10 1/4, Oct. 1st, 1901 it was 7 1/4. There was a difference of 2,497 bales with a reduction of 2 1/2 in the price which amounts to a great deal. The cotton crop is short and is also a little late on account of the bad weather this past summer. We hope the crop will not be as short as is now reported.

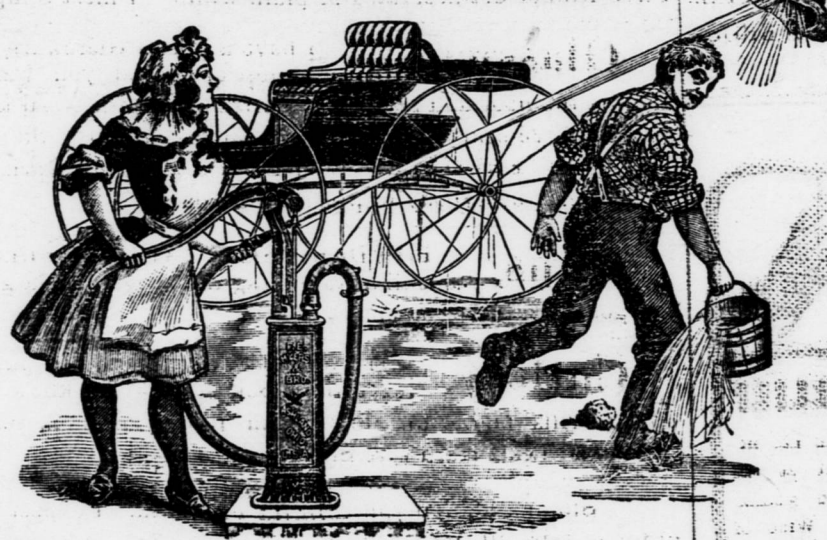
