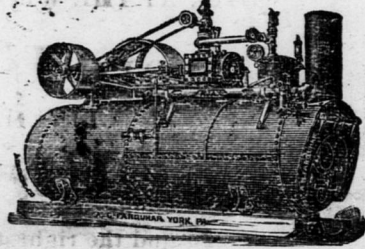

### Limiting Lawyer's Speeches.

The Greensboro Record says that Judge Shaw, holding Guilford Superior Court, succeeded, last Friday afternoon, in getting the four attorneys in a suit being tried, to limit their speeches fifteen minutes each, and that thus a half day was saved, and The Record remarks that "the law giving the presiding judge power to limit debate should be restored by all means." This proposition is eminently sound. A great deal of time is consumed unnecessarily in our courts in arguments by attorneys, and no one knows this as well as themselves. The best class of them would hail with satisfaction the restoration to the judge of authority to limit the number and length of arguments to be made. It is so in the United States courts, and nobody suffers. It was formerly so in the State courts but many years ago, as many, perhaps as twenty-five, Judge Watts, holding court in Johnson county, was alleged to have abused the power and out of this grew the present condition. The old order of things should be restored and in saying this we mean to imply nothing against the lawyers—the salt of the earth. They are wholly at fault, for a litigant, employing say three of them in his case, does not think they have earned their fees unless each of them speaks as long and as loud as his physical condition will permit. ### Advice to Negroes.

Gov. Aycock Addresses Them at Their Fair in Raleigh.

Governor Aycock last week at the State Fair Grounds at Raleigh opened the Thirty-Second Annual Negro Fair. He said in part:

"I wish the colored people of North Carolina to understand by every act of mine that I am the Governor of the entire State and all its people, and that every interest which concerns any individual is a matter of importance to me. It has been gratifying to me that those to whom I have been opposed politically have recognized the real feeling which exists in my heart. The colored people of North Carolina are entitled to much credit for what they have done. At the close of the war there were many who had great apprehension as to the conduct which would result from the freedom of the negro. I am glad to be able to state that that apprehension proved to be unfounded. Your conduct in the main has been admirable. You have surpassed expectations. You have been sober, law-abiding and industrious. You have created more value in freedom than you did in slavery, and, taking all in all, you deserve the thanks of the Commonwealth.

"But you will pardon me as one who is a friend of yours for speaking to you to-day words which may seem unkind, but are, in fact, kind because truthful. There are many things in your freedom which you have neglected. There are many things yet for you to do. In glancing through the criminal statistics of the State I find that while your race constitutes one-third of the population of North Carolina, you commit one-half of the crimes. I am not un mindful of the fact that your race is poor and weak and without the influence of the dominant race, and that, therefore, in proportion to actual crime committed a few more are indicted than would be if you were rich and powerful with the influences which tend to suppress indictments. But the proportion of crime in your race is startling and dangerous and one which ought to evoke your most earnest consideration.

"It may not be inappropriate for me upon this occasion to express to you that recent events occurring in the nation may not unduly excite you and that you will still remember that your best friends are those who live in your State. What you wish, what you need more than recognition by the President or other people in authority is the establishment among yourselves of a society founded upon culture, intelligence and virtue, and in no wise dependent upon those of a different race. The law which separates you from the white people in the State socially always has been and always will be inexorable, and it need not concern you nor me whether that law is violated elsewhere, for it will never be violated in the South. Its violation would be to your destruction as well as to the injury of the whites. No thoughtful, conservative and upright Southerner has for your race aught but the kindest feeling, and we are willing and anxious to see you grow into the high citizenship of which you are capable, and we are willing to give our energies and best thought to aid you in the great work necessary to make you what you are capable of and to assist you in that elevation of character and virtue

"But to do this it is absolutely necessary that each race should remain distinct and have a society of its own. Inside of your own race you can grow as large and broad and high as God permits, with the aid, the sympathy and the encouragement of your white neighbors. If you can equal the white race in achievement, in scholarship, in art, in industry and in commerce you will find no generous-minded white man who will stand in your way, but all of them in the South will insist that you shall accomplish this high end without social intermingling. And this is well for you; it is well for us; it is necessary for the peace of our section; it is essential to the education of your children that there should be no misunderstanding upon this point. I am sure that you agree with me in what I have said, and in the spirit of one who is the Governor of the whole people, without regard to race, I bid you God speed in the great work of upbuilding our State and educating all her children."

This Association was organized in 1875 with 742 members. It now numbers 26 churches and 2,226 members. It sent up to its second session after the peace of our section; it is essential to the education of your children that there should be no misunderstanding upon this point. I am sure that you agree with me in what I have said, and in the spirit of one who is the Governor of the whole people, without regard to race, I bid you God speed in the great work of upbuilding our State and educating all her children."

### Tomfoolery And Otherwise.

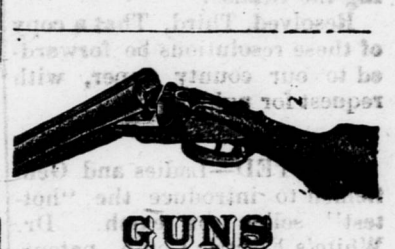
