Hon. D. H. McLean, Secretary and Treasurer of the North Carolina Railroad Company, left to-day for his office at Burlington to pay the 20th dividend of 7 per cent. upon the capital stock of the Company. This means the paying out of one hundred and forty thousand dollars to the stock holders. The same sum will be paid out in July of this year, making the annual dividend of \$280,000, of this amount the State receives \$210,000, the balance goes to the private stock holders. The shares of the stock in this Company are worth \$173 per share or 73 per cent above par.

Died by the Road-side.
 The community about Buie's Creek was shocked last Saturday evening when the news of the death of Mr. James D. Barnes, a highly respected citizen of that community, was announced. Mr. Barnes had been to Dunn that day to meet a couple of young men who were attending school at Buie's Creek, and left town in the afternoon about 4 o'clock. He became cold on the way and got out the wagon to walk, leaving the young men to drive. Just this side of Mr. W. T. Dupree's farm he fell by the road-side dead. He had been suffering for several weeks with a pain about the heart and the cause of his death is supposed to be heart failure. He was a most excellent citizen, a quiet peaceable, hard-working man. He was a brother of Mrs. W. F. Pearson and an uncle of Mrs. J. P. Pittman of our town. He leaves a wife and six small children. The funeral service was conducted Monday morning at 11 o'clock by Rev. E. M. Snipes, in the presence of a large number of relatives and friends. We extend sympathy to the bereaved.
