EDENTON HAS PAVING FEVER

The prospects now are that most of the principal streets in Edenton will be paved within the next few months. The first district, including a great part of Main, nearly all of King and Water and part of Oakum, is already torn up and the actual laying of bricks has begun on Water street. The curbing is in and much of the grading done on most of these streets. Now the other parts of the town say "as we must help to pay for that district, give us something on which you can help us to pay." Already petitions are in before the council asking that Magnolia street and sidewalk be paved between Main and Granville streets. A petition is also being circulated and has a great number of signatures to pave Main street all the way out beyond the Fair Grounds, Granville street up to Albemarle street, Queen all the way to the depot and a great part of Church. If these petitions receive the required number of signatures, it means that the principal streets in Edenton will be paved.
