### MR. H. A. BOND DEAD

Mr. Henry Alexander Bond, age 78, died at his home about 9:25 a. m. Monday September 3, 1917. He had been in bad health for several months and the end was expected. The deceased was born September 23, 1844, and was at death the oldest native man of Edenton. In 1871 he was married to Miss Emma Hudgins, who survives him. He is also survived by four daughters, Mrs. W. M. Badham of Edenton, Mrs. James Webb of Hillsboro, Mrs. H. H. Preston and Mrs. Chas. H. Wood of Edenton; one son, Mr. H. T. Bond of Burgess, N. C.; two sisters, Mrs. Mary E. White and Mrs. Lela M. Jones of Edenton; two brothers, Millard F. Bond, Sr., and John C. Bond of Edenton; one half sister, Mrs. J. A. Woodard of Edenton; and ten grand children. The funeral service at 11 a. m. Tuesday was conducted from the home by Rev. R. B. Drane and the body interred in St. Paul's church yard. The pallbearers were Messrs. W. S. Sammerell, J. M. Vail, R. O. Holland, Meredith Jones, J. L. Wiggins, J. R. Wheeler, Walter B. White and R. P. Badham.

Mr. Bond was for a number of years book-keeper for the store of the Branning Mfg. Co. He represented the County in the Legislature twice and was the father of the "Water Front Land Entry Law," in the interest of the fishermen. He is the first of his brothers and sisters to pass away.

The Misses Simpson and Miss Wynne entertained several of their friends Sunday evening.

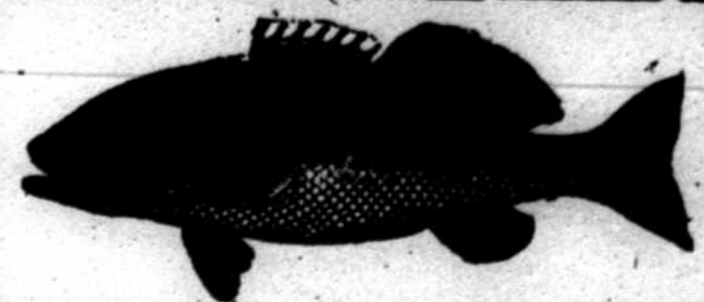
