Notice to Fishermen!

At the last meeting of the Fisheries Commission Board held at Morehead City, N. C., on the 5th day of July 1917, a motion was offered as follows:

"That the closed season for shad and herring shall be from April 30th to January 1st, during which time it shall be unlawful to catch with any net, seine or other appliance, any shad or herring in the waters of North Carolina."

The consideration of this motion was deferred until a meeting of the Board to be held at Edenton, N. C., on the 2nd day of October 1917.

All parties interested are requested to meet the Board at said meeting and if they so desire, they will be heard on this subject.

At a special meeting of the Town Council Sept. 18, 1917, for the purpose of discussing trimming trees and such other business as the board might deem necessary. Present, E. B. Conger, Mayor; J. H. McMullan, Jr., J. L. Wiggins, J. R. Wheeler and E. C. Rea.

Mesdames W. D. Pruden, E. B. Mariner and J. A. Woodard in the interest of the Civic League and Mr. Frank Wood appeared asking that the board have parties trimming trees use their very best judgment and not cut limbs unnecessarily. Messrs. Willis Owens and A. T. Baker were also present by invitation of the Council.

Upon motion duly carried it is ordered that all trees in middle of Main street from Queen street to Magnolia street be removed, and it is further ordered that Main street between Queen street and Magnolia street be paved from curb to curb.

Upon motion duly carried the Mayor and Mr. J. R. Wheeler are appointed a committee to confer with the Civic League relative to removing the following trees: One in front of Byrum Brothers Hardware store, one in front of Owens' store, one in front of Auditorium Property, one on Northwest corner Woodard Hotel and one in front of the Methodist church. It is ordered that this committee be empowered to have the afore-mentioned trees removed if their best judgment suggests it.

Upon motion duly carried it is ordered that one dozen push brooms be ordered from J. D. Westbrook at once.
