RATHER CURIOUS RESULT.

FROM INVESTIGATION AT N. C. EXPERIMENT STATION.

From the Washington Post. "A rather curious result came recently from some parallel investigations about the nitrification of soils, pursued by the experiment station in North Carolina, and by Profs. Jenkins and Britton, at New Haven," said Prof. W. A. Withers of Raleigh yesterday at the Ebbitt. "We were investigating especially the rapidity of the formation of nitrates in the soil, and concluded that the following fertilizers showed most rapid nitrification: dried blood, cottonseed meal, dried fish, tankage, bat guano, bone, and ammonia sulphate in the order mentioned. After three weeks we found that one-third of the nitrogen in the dried blood had been converted into nitrates. The New Haven investigators arrived at the same conclusion as we did, except as to the ammonia sulphate. We placed that last on the list, and they placed it first. Subsequently we repeated our experiments to determine whether we had erred, but arrived at the same results as before. Another investigator also reached the same conclusion."
