Zeb V. Nettles to Speak at Political Gathering Saturday

ROAD MEETING AT W.N.C. TOWN

MacDougall Reports Much Enthusiasm Shown Over Route 284

Duncan MacDougall, chairman of the roads committee of the Chamber of Commerce, and moving spirit in plans for highway expansion in this section, was invited guest at a joint meeting of the Board of Commerce, Western North Carolina and South Carolina in Bryson City, last Saturday, and brings glowing reports of the enthusiasm shown at the meeting over the prospects of completion of highways which will knit Knoxville with Brevard and Greenville and points south.

Plans were made at the Bryson City meeting for dedication of the new highway bisecting the Smoky Mountain National park at a tri-state meeting to be held at an early date, the celebration to be staged near the North Carolina-Tennessee state line. Brevard's interest in the movement is the completion of 284, which will provide a short route from Greenville and points south via Brevard to Knoxville and the Middle West, allowing through traffic on one of the most beautiful scenic routes in all of Eastern America.

Farm Loans Must Be Made Friday

Friday of this week will be the last day on which applications will be accepted for the government seed loans, according to announcement made this week by Mrs. Roland Owen and Mrs. Ira Galloway, who are assisting in the work with headquarters at the Jones Motor company in Brevard.

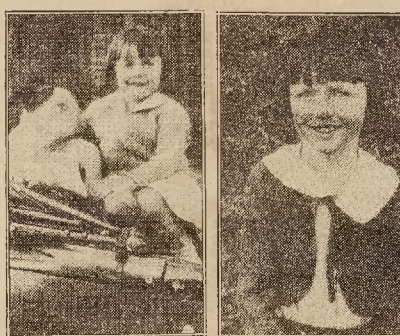

ROSMAN ENDS SCHOOL TERM WITH PROGRAM

High Averages Made by Two Girls in Graduating Class

REV. JESSE R. OWEN SPEAKER AT SERVICE

Commencement exercises of the Rosman school were brought to a close Friday night when the 15 members of the graduating class were presented their diplomas by Principal G. C. Bush, and the literary address to the seniors was delivered by Dr. R. L. Moore, of Mars Hill College. One of the largest audiences said to have ever been present at the school auditorium was in evidence on this occasion, the other exercises of the week being largely attended.

Other features of the closing exercises were the valedictory address by Irene Pharr, and the salutatory by L. Verne Whitmore, the former making the high average of 98.7 for the four years of high school, while the latter won a close second with an average of 94.7 for the four years.

To Launch Work for Brevard That Will Mean Much to Section

OFFICIALS WILL BE SELECTED FOR YEAR

All people interested in the future of Brevard and with especial interest in a profitable summer season this year are requested to meet at the courthouse Friday night of this week, April 29, at 8 o'clock sharp, at which time the Chamber of Commerce work for the year will be launched.

Among the business to be transacted at the meeting will be the election of officers and directors to serve for the year, together with other matters pertaining to the welfare of Brevard and the surrounding community.

Special request is made that all who were members of the organization during the past year, together with all business people, hotel and boarding house keepers, be present at this meeting. The meeting will be open to all citizens of the county and any person will have privilege of bringing attention to the organization to any phase of work beneficial to the community.

Much real work has been done by the Chamber of Commerce during the past year, and this on a small sum of money. President Jerry Jerome and members of the official group of the organization have been very active and have been allied co-operation in the projects on which they have worked during the past 12 months, and it is the opinion that the organization will have this loyal support again this year.

Committees appointed last year by President Jerome have been very active and have made progress that is easily recognized as coming from efforts put forth by the Chamber of Commerce organization. Roads committee and tourist committee, together with the work of the Woman's Bureau have been outstanding factors in the community's welfare.

TOXOID CLINIC DATES LISTED

Diphtheria Treatment To Be Given Pre-School Children

Plans have been perfected for operation of the pre-school clinic which will be held in Brevard on Tuesday, May 10, and in other sections of the county throughout the week of May 14.

The clinic is for all children entering school for the first time next fall, and parents are asked to bring or send in their children from 4 to 7 years of age for physical examinations, and to be given diphtheria toxoid in cases where the parents wish it for their children.

The clinic in Brevard and throughout the county is sponsored by the Parent-Teacher association, which Mrs. S. P. Verner is president, by Dr. C. L. Newland, county health officer, by Supt. J. B. Jones, county welfare officer, and by the North Carolina board of health.

MANY ATTEND EXERCISES OF BREVARD HIGH

Programs Well Received by Patrons; Dr. Poole Is Heard

DIPLOMAS GIVEN TO FORTY-THREE GRADS

Closing exercises of the Brevard high school commencement were held Friday night at the school auditorium, when the presentation of diplomas to the 43 graduates was made by Supt. J. B. Jones, and the prayers were offered by Dr. Frank K. Poole, of Furman university, Greenville, S. C.

Dr. Poole, in a forceful and inspirational address, pointed out the value of an education, stating that it is a tool which fits for broader life and usefulness, and creates in a person a greater understanding and appreciation of the experiences incident to later adult life. He made an eloquent appeal to the young graduates before he turned to public education advantages to the best use in fitting them for places of the greatest service in life.

The valedictory address, was given by Louise Gillespie, the salutatory and benediction was given by Rev. Harry Perry, pastor of St. Phillips Episcopal church. The program was directed by Rhueben Reddingfield, was very impressive with the sophomores, as laurel bearers, leading the way of the seniors down the aisle to their proper seats on the platform. M. W. Galloway Candidate for Representative

M. W. Galloway, of Brevard, long prominent in political and business life in the community, makes announcement this week that he is a candidate for nomination on the Democratic ticket for representative in the next session of the General Assembly.

Galloway is a native of Transylvania and received his education in the county schools, and the two privately owned schools connected in the county before the advent of high schools here. A farmer and school teacher, Mr. Galloway later entered the political field and was twice elected by the Democratic party as representative in the state legislature.

He has, however, filled other places of trust, having been a postal clerk under the U. S. postoffice department, clerk in the Brevard postoffice, deputy insurance commissioner for Western North Carolina and state game warden.

He has announced that he is in favor of reevaluation of all real property, state maintenance of the public school system, and is opposed to the short ballot.

He has also announced an ambition for representative, and adds zest to an already interesting race.

M. B. Bagwell Offers for Township Constable

M. B. Bagwell, one of the best known citizens in Brevard, announces in this week's issue of The Times that he is a candidate on the Democratic ticket for nomination and election as constable of Brevard township.

Mr. Bagwell is a native of Transylvania county, having been a farmer and merchant here for many years, and is offering for the first time for public office.
