

Primary To Be Held Saturday

Many Entrants in Democratic Race for Places on County Ticket

Primary election will hold the interest of all the people of Transylvania county on Saturday of this week, when both the Democrats and Republicans will go to the polls to nominate their favorites in the various races.

REPUBLICAN RACE

In the Republican contest, only two names are to be filed, that of State senator, R. B. Overton, formerly of Brevard but now of Jackson county for the place of state senator, while George W. DePriest, of Shelby, is running as a write-in candidate. The Democratic candidate, who was selected at the state Republican convention to make the race for United States senator. All other candidates of the Republican ticket were nominated in convention.

DEMOCRATIC RACE

In the county race much interest is being shown, four men being out for nomination on the Democratic ticket for member of the general assembly, as follows: W. M. Henry, Reidsville; Tom S. Wood and H. C. Aiken of Brevard, and John L. Wilson of Enon.

O. L. Erwin and Mrs. T. H. Galloway of Brevard, are in the race for the treasurer's place, L. V. Sigmon, of Rosman, and W. B. Henderson, of Lake Toxaway, both members of the present board of commissioners are filed for nomination and reelection, with W. L. Aiken of Brevard and L. F. Lyday of Enon also making.

With a large number of candidates out on the Democratic state ticket, and workers busy in the affairs of their parties for the coming year, the Democratic state ticket has assumed greater proportions of interest here than ever before.

Thurman, Maxwell, and Fountain each have a wide circle of friends in the county, and the governor's race here will remain in doubt until the final count-up is made, it is believed.

In the senatorial race, Bowie, Reynolds and Morrison each have had their causes pled before the voters, and the contest between Bowie and Reynolds each speaking here in the past few days, while Ehringhaus was represented by Judge T. L. Johnson of Asheville. However, these races do not compare in interest with that of the sheriff and representative.

GIRL SCOUTS AT CAMP SAPPHIRE FOR TEN DAYS

Thirty-five Girls Will Attend Model Sessions Near Here

B. & P. CLUB IS SPONSOR OF MOVE

Fetzer Donates Use of Excellent Facilities to the Work

Thirty-five Girl Scouts and a large group of leaders and counselors are camped for ten days at Camp Sapphire for the annual Girl Scout summer camp. The camp is in charge of Miss Bertie Ballard as leader and Mrs. Hinton McLeod as assistant leader. Members of the Brevard Business and Professional Women's club, sponsors of the Scout movement in Transylvania county, are in charge of business affairs of the camp.

With the splendid equipment provided by Camp Sapphire and the type of leadership used in the camp, authorities assert that there will not be a better Girl Scout camp operated in the south this year. Camp Sapphire is being donated to the use of the Scouts, as is other necessary work, Dr. Chas. L. Newland, and Mrs. C. Y. Patton are giving medical attention, while the many counselors and leaders are all donating their services.

Many methods have been pursued by the Business Women's group in effort to obtain funds for operation of the camp, several hundred dollars of actual expense money being needed to put the program across that will meet with approval of national Scout headquarters. Beginning with the first day of camp the following schedule will be observed:

Reveille, at 6:30 a. m.; 6:55, colors; 7:10, breakfast; 7:40, camp chores; 8:30, inspection; 8:50, instruction in nature singing; 9:15, instruction in nature singing; 11:10, instruction in canoeing, swimming, diving, life saving; 12:10, free time; 12:30, dinner.

Beginning the afternoon program at 1 o'clock with camp chores; 2:00 rest and sleep one hour; 3:15, recreational swim; 4:00, instruction in map making, pioneering, nature study, canoeing; 5:20, free time; 6:00, supper.

Evening programs will be varied with hikes, folk dancing, and various types of approved entertainment. The following program being generally carried out, but with variations, as will be the case in programs for morning and afternoon: 6:00, camp chores; 7:15, instruction in nature singing; 8:00, nature study, canoeing; 9:30, taps for seniors.

Officers as counselors from national headquarters are expected to visit the camp during the sessions, according to announcement, the national organization giving the sanction for the program. Plans recently announced for operation of the camp.

EXCHANGE TO BE OPERATED BY W. BUREAU

Fancy Work and Food-stuffs Will Be Handled by Group

Featuring the meeting of the Woman's Bureau, held Monday afternoon, was the perfecting of plans for operation of a women's exchange in Brevard this summer.

According to present plans and indications this enterprise will move one of Brevard's greatest summer attractions and benefits for tourists, as well as residents. An added feature, assuring success to the project, is the fact that Miss Lillian Jenkins has been secured to be in charge of the exchange, which will operate six days a week through June, July and August, and decision was made to operate it in the rooms formerly occupied by the Chamber of Commerce on East Main street.

The exchange, which is for the sale of fancy work and eatables contributed by any one having such saleable articles is open to any resident of the town or county paying an entrance fee of 50 cents for the season. Ten per cent of all articles sold at the exchange will go to the bureau, the remaining proceeds of sale going to the one contributing the article purchased.

Mrs. R. F. Beasley is chairman and originator of the women's exchange project, and much credit is due for its successful and promising operation to her and Mrs. Katherine Griffin, both of whom have given valuable time and effort toward the undertaking.

Other matters of business pertaining to the welfare of the organization and to the community in general, which were perfected at Monday's meeting, included the decision to start work at once on the purchase and beautification of the vacant lot at the corner of Caldwell and Jordan streets for a recreational park, equipped with comfortable benches, swings, sand pits, and a pretty background of blooming flowers and plants.

Request is made that anyone having flower seeds, plants or shrubs and willing to donate them for beautification of the park, communicate with Mrs. Charles E. Orr, any donations being greatly appreciated by the committee in charge.

According to decision of the members, the bureau will act as hostesses at the formal opening of the new Almona hospital, which will be an event in the near future.

Fine Potatoes On Powell Farm

L. E. Powell, merchant and stock farmer of the Rockbrook tract, can justly lay claim to a patch of the most perfect looking potatoes in the county. Two months old, and vines knee high with bloom showing, his one-quarter acre patch is to all appearances, perfect.

Mr. Powell used the flat-bed method for planting his seed, using certified Irish Cobbler and an 8-16 potato fertilizer. Instead of putting the fertilizer in the drill with the potatoes Mr. Powell prepared a deep seed bed and then planted the seed, and then turned each side of the drill, allowing the potatoes to sprout before coming in contact with the fertilizer.

Mr. Powell says that his idea of growing potatoes is to use good seed and plenty of spray material, at least five sprayings being required to a crop.
