

FIRST HUNTING WILL BE ALLOWED SEPT. 1

Dove Season Opens For Thirty Days Next Thursday—Other Open Dates Given

Dove season opens on Sept. 1 it has been announced by the State Department of Conservation and Development, and the squirrel season next to open on Sept. 15.

Bird hunters will have a longer wait this fall before they start out with dog and gun to get 15 quail (or less). Opening of the quail season is set for Dec. 15, closing on Feb. 20.

Deer season is from Oct. 1 to Jan. 1, and the same on bear. The lowly rabbit is now classed as a game animal (or rodent) and is not allowed to be killed before Nov. 20.

Kindergarten School Starts In September

Holden Released By Magistrates Hearing

Charge of murder against Foy Holden of Pisgah Forest was dismissed in a preliminary hearing here Tuesday afternoon by Magistrates Robert Orr and Welch Galloway.

Charge of murder was brought against young Holden by Mrs. Roxie Masters, widow of Les Masters who was killed on Feb. 12, 1937, when a truck driven by Foy Holden struck him. The fatal crash occurred near Brevard high school on Broad street.

Several witnesses were presented by the state, including Mrs. Masters, Billy Nicholson, Harry Stroud, Charles Lee Mull, and Henry Ball. The defense put no witnesses on the stand.

Billy Nicholson, most important witness, stated that in his opinion the light truck which was being driven by Foy Holden and which struck Mr. Masters was traveling at about 30 miles per hour. Young Nicholson said he was going north on Broad street when the man was killed, and that Masters started across the street at intersection and seemingly ran into the front of the truck.

Nicholson said on cross examination that the truck swerved to the left as if to avoid hitting the man, and that impact of the truck knocked Masters 25 feet or more when it struck him.

Attorney Shepherd of Hendersonville appeared for the state and Pat Kimzey of Brevard appeared for Holden.

Mr. Masters was an employee of the Transylvania Tanning company, and left a widow and six children.

Unveiling Ceremonies On Sunday Afternoon

Marker unveiling ceremonies at the grave of Benjamin Davidson will be held at the old Davidson River cemetery at 2 o'clock Sunday afternoon.

The ceremonies will be in charge of the D.A.R. chapter of Hendersonville, which was instrumental in having the government monument erected. The Brevard D.A.R. chapter has been invited to attend the unveiling, and any others who are interested.

Benjamin Davidson was a Revolutionary soldier, and died in 1826. He was one of the early settlers of the French Broad Valley, and had a large grant of land in the Pisgah Forest area. Davidson River was named for him.

SCHOOL DENTISTS TO BEGIN WORK MONDAY

Health Unit Workers Will Be Here Until All Sections Have Been Visited

Dental clinics for the Brevard and Rosman schools will begin Monday, sponsored by the state health department and the local county health unit.

Dr. I. W. Farrell and Dr. Raymer, of the state health department, will conduct the clinics, in cooperation with the Transylvania health unit.

Following two weeks' of the Brevard and Rosman clinics, the work will be carried on in other schools of the county. The clinics are for all underprivileged school children of the county under 13 years of age.

During last year's dental clinic held in the county schools here, the records show that 1,117 children were examined, and 788 children were given treatment.

ROAD SURFACE BIDS BE RECEIVED 30TH

Treatment of Boylston and Pisgah Forest Highways Slated For Spring

Surfacing contracts will be let on August 30 by the State Highway commission for 5.6 miles of Transylvania roads. It has been announced from Raleigh.

Lower link of the Pisgah National Forest road, 5.6 miles in to be let, with surfacing probably not to start until next April. On the Boylston road 5.6 miles now under construction will also be let for surfacing, this work also to be done in the spring.

Contract has already been let to R. B. Tyler of Louisville, Ky., for 9.5 miles on the upper end of the Pisgah National Forest road, and the entire 15 miles is expected to be completed by June first of next year, or sooner.

Highway Commissioner E. L. McKee has stated that connecting link between the Transylvania county line and the Horse Shoe-Mills River road will be let for construction this fall. This link will tie in with the stretch now being built through Boylston by C. A. Ragland, and will give a short paved route into Asheville.

Construction on lower end of 284 will be completed during the coming month, and the road will be open for travel during the fall and winter, with a stone surface from the Pisgah Forest entrance to Wagon Road gap. This work is being done by Chandler Brothers.
