NEWS BRIEFLY TOLD

DISPATCHES OF IMPORTANT HAPPENINGS GATHERED FROM OVER THE WORLD.

FOR THE BUSY READER

The Occurrences Of Seven Days Given In An Epitomized Form For Quick Reading

Foreign—

Constantinople has at last been occupied by allied forces. The demonstration by the allies against Turkey was carried out with but one untoward happening, a serious clash at the war office, where Turks resisted allied troops. All excitement has quieted down.

Chancellor Kapp and his chief officials in Germany have resigned. The news is confirmed. Wolfgang Kapp has fled Berlin, leaving the chancellor in an automobile in the small hours of the morning.

The Peruvian legation at La Paz, the Bolivian capital, is reported to have been attacked by a mob of a thousand men. The Peruvian consulate and private residences were also attacked. The government shields on the official building were torn down and windows were broken.

The counter revolution in Germany appears to have reached the end of the road. There is a strong probability that shortly one government will be in control and that President Ebert will come back to Berlin with his ministers.

A revolt has broken out among several units of the Japanese troops in Siberia, according to a wireless dispatch sent out by the Soviet government at Moscow. The soldiers ripped off their shoulder straps and substituted red straps.

It is reported that the Japanese government is taking stern measures to squelch the Communist movement in the Nipponese kingdom.

Advices received in Amsterdam indicate that the Dutch government will take no chances with the former kaiser of Germany and his son, the crown prince, and has increased the guard around the former emperor's retreat.

It is stated that the former crown prince of Germany is watching all reports from Germany with the closest interest. However, the prince's aide de camp announces that the prince has no connection whatever with the revolution now in progress.

The British and French governments have notified Prince Feisal, son of the king of the Hedjaz, that they cannot recognize the validity of the decision of the Damascus congress, which proclaimed him king of Syria.

The assassination of 27 police and government employees in Ireland since January 1 of last year was officially announced in the house of commons by James Ian MacPherson, chief secretary for Ireland.

Many radicals who were deported from the United States on the steamship Buford have been suffering privations since they arrived in Russia. They have failed to locate their relatives and have not yet secured any employment.

Two hundred Americans who have been attending the fair at Leipzig have telegraphed and telephoned Maj. Gen. H. T. Allen, commanding the American army of occupation, urgently asking for help to leave Leipzig, where they describe conditions as dangerous to their lives.

Washington—

Income and excess profits taxes cannot be reduced until after 1922. Secretary Houston wrote to the house ways and means committee, urging an immediate simplification of these taxes and substitution of a flat tax on excess profits instead of the graduated rates of 20 and 40 per cent.

The United States by 1924 will have a navy equal to any in the world if the program outlined in the appropriation bill, formally reported to the house is carried out. This is in spite of the big reductions made in the recommendations. Under present program the United States will have 47 fighting ships of the first and second line, as compared with sixty of Great Britain.

Repeated attempts to tow to deeper water the submarine H-1 which was grounded off Redondo Point, Magdalena Bay, without the loss of four lives, have failed through snapping of the lines, according to radio messages from Commander McCrary of the destroyer Sinclair. The body of Lieut. Com. James R. Webb, killed when the H-1 grounded, was believed still to be aboard the dive. The body of Seaman Joseph Kaufman has not been recovered.

The interstate commerce commission has ruled that class and commodity rates from Ohio and Mississippi river crossings, Chicago and relate points, were unduly preferential.

Establishment of a committee of railroad directors and another representing the largest shipping organizations of the country to confer with committees of the National Association of Owners of Railroad Securities to prevent "further errors" was recommended in a report adopted by the government committees of the association and made public recently.

Insistent representations to Bolivia not to disturb the peace of South America has been made by the American government as a result of the anti-Peruvian manifestations at La Paz. Officials view the situation as serious. Embassy officials expressed the belief that there was an effort to force Peru into a war against its former ally in the eighties, Chile.

Congress may take steps to determine whether the United States soldiers now in Germany are to be used against the revolutionists in the event that allied leaders order such action. The allied nations soon will launch a drive for the cancellation of the loans of ten billion dollars made to them by the United States during the war and for further contributions by this government toward internationalization of the entire war debt.

A bill proposing that the United States extend a credit of one billion dollars to Germany has been introduced in the house. The result of the plan, the mover says, would be that Germany could buy food and raw materials in this country.

A resolution proposed legislation to "tax into the United States treasury" surplus war profits held by the Standard Oil company, the United States Steel corporation and other companies or corporations, for the benefit of former service men, has been introduced in the house.

Approximately 24,000 motor vehicles intended for war purposes have been turned over to the department of agriculture by the war department for distribution among the state highway commissioners for use in road building allotments.

The extent to which motor vehicles are supplanting the horse on farms is problematical, the department of agriculture announces, which announcement discloses that at least fifty thousand farmers in the country own motor trucks. The best demand for horses is in the South.

Approval of a proposal that if "consistent with the general interests of the United States," American steamship companies take over the trade routes and business of the Hamburg-American line was voted by the senate commerce committee, 22 to 4.

The Bulgarian government has won a complete victory over the revolutionists who were behind the railroad strike, according to diplomatic advices received at Washington. The strike has been called off without the strikers obtaining any concessions.

Domestic—

Agents under Maj. A. V. Dalrymple, prohibition commissioner for the six central states, are relieved of all power except to locate contraband liquor, by an order issued by John F. Kramer national prohibition supervisor, headquarters in Chicago.

Alleged misreading of a doctor's prescription resulted in the death of Mrs. Bertha de Kara of Brooklyn, and arrest of Arthur C. Searls, a pharmacist, on the charge of manslaughter.

The Davidson county, Tennessee, grand jury returned indictments against several city detectives charging them with the abduction on November 19 last, of J. B. Lawson, a visiting official of the street railway employees' association. Three sets of indictments were returned.

The Maryland house of delegates, without a roll call, adopted the favorable report on the Jones three and a half per cent liquor bill, after reaching an understanding that the bill will be open to amendment on the third reading.

Rev. Dr. P. A. Baker, general superintendent of the Anti-Saloon League, has issued a statement announcing the league will not support any candidate for president who is not in favor of prohibition, and that "eleventh hour" conversions will not be considered.

Sheriff A. P. Warren of Warren county, Tennessee, was arraigned in the federal court at Nashville and pleaded not guilty to a distilling charge. He was indicted and his trial will be held at the present term of court.

Relatives of American soldiers who fell in France who wish the bodies of men to remain in France may have them interred either in an American or French cemetery, states the graves registration section of the war department.

The New York customs house has been turned into a temple of higher mathematics as millionaire and day laborer with brows equally wrinkled seek to compute their federal income taxes in the final hours of grace.

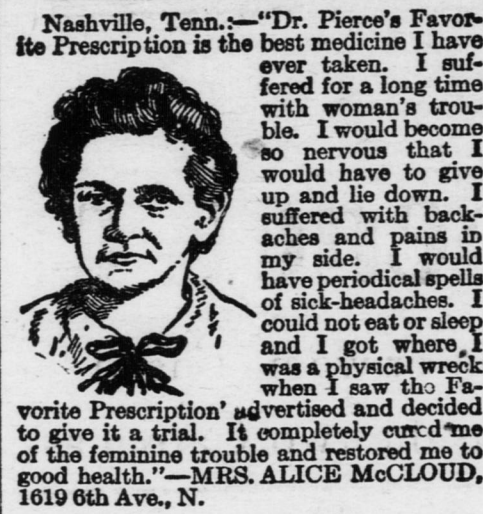

Ratification of the national suffrage amendment by the West Virginia state legislature will be carried to the courts immediately on the motion of the National Association Opposed to Woman Suffrage.

The Francisco Sugar company, a New Jersey corporation, admitted in the court of chancery at Newark, N. J., that the company proposed to lease its assets to a Cuban corporation to be known as the Compania Azucar Francisco in order to escape payment of federal income and excess profits taxes.

The Rev. A. M. Johnson of Columbus, Ohio, was arrested by the police on complaint of the wife of an attorney who charges the minister with the theft of over seven thousand dollars' worth of jewelry and securities.

CONGRESS CAN NOT ALONE MAKE PEACE

CONCURRENT RESOLUTIONS BY HOUSE AND SENATE WOULD BE UNCONSTITUTIONAL.

PRESIDENT ONLY HAS RIGHT

To Congress is Delegated Power to Declare War, But Negotiation and Agreement for Peace Making.

Augusta, Ga.—In an interview here Senator Hitchcock says:

"There is a disposition among certain senators to attempt to terminate the war with the adoption by the senate and the house of a concurrent resolution, declaring that a state of peace exists, this resolution to be signed by the president, but I am of the opinion that this cannot be done because in the framing of the constitution of the United States, the war making function was delegated to congress, but the right to terminate war by the negotiation of a peace treaty was vested in the chief executive."

"My opinion is that the framers of the constitution acted wisely in that respect, for, while the declaration of war requires action by but one part to the conflict, there must be negotiation and agreement between both parties when peace is effectuated."

Duchess of Marlborough Wants Divorce from Duke

London.—The application of the Duchess of Marlborough, formerly Consuelo Vanderbilt, for a decree for the restitution of conjugal rights, was granted by the court. The petition of the duchess is the usual preliminary to divorce in this country. The court orders the decree to be obeyed within 14 days after its service.

The couple were married in New York in 1935 and have two children.

Civil Service Commission Now Has Woman Member

Washington.—Helen Hamilton Gardner, of this city, author and lecturer, was nominated by President Wilson to be a member of the civil service commission. She will succeed Chas. M. Galloway, of Columbia, S. C., who was "ousted" from the commission last year after the president had determined to reorganize it.

Mrs. Gardner is the first woman to be appointed to the commission.

Huns Begin Propaganda Hoping to Force Revision of Peace Treaty.

Paris.—Germans are preparing a formidable world propaganda in favor of a revision of the Versailles treaty and the holding of a new international conference at which vanquished nations might be represented for the object of changing or eliminating many clauses of the present treaty between the allied nations and Germany, according to a Geneva despatch.

Relief Ships for Europe Will be Used Also for Deporting Soviets.

New York.—Relief ships to be sent by the United States within the next month with flour for needy countries of Europe also are going to be soviet arks, according to information obtained from immigration officials here. More than 400 Russians, Finns and Poles from all parts of the country will be shipped on them.

Eight Thousand Persons Have Been Killed Since German Revolt Began.

Paris.—Eight thousand persons have been killed since the German revolt broke out on March 13, according to advices received here. Of the number, 850 were killed in Berlin alone.

Recommendation Senate Committee as to Bainbridge Colby Is Confirmed

Washington.—The nomination of Bainbridge Colby as secretary of state was confirmed late by the senate.

It was understood that no objection was raised to confirmation of the nomination, which has been the subject of extended secret hearings by the foreign relations committee.

It is stated also that no record vote was taken on the matter of confirming the nomination of Mr. Colby.

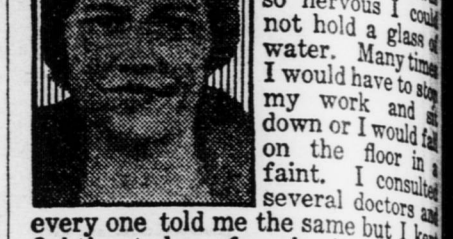
Great Demonstration Meets Possible Mexican President
