BAPTIST CHURCH NEWS

Dr. Stevens preached Sunday morning on "Taking a Safe Chance," from Acts 27:13 and Sunday evening his theme was "The Three Crosses," taking as a text Luke 23:39-41. There was one conversion and addition to the church at the evening service.

Their many friends wish for them much happiness.






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
