BAPTIST CHURCH NEWS

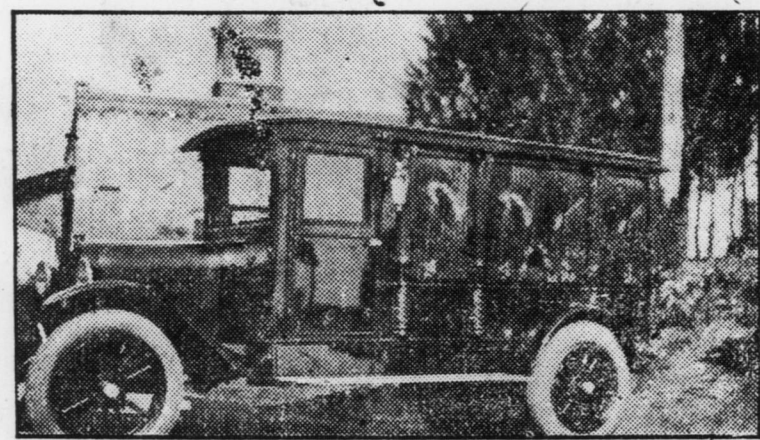
The training school held at the church last week was very successful and most all those who attended took the examinations. The class in the Normal Manual only finished the first division and are continuing the study of the second division.
