

### DR. ORAN MOORE SPEAKS AT COUNTY CLUB MEETING

Joint Meeting of Rutherford County Club and County Medical Society Held Friday at Rutherfordton.

Rutherfordton, Sept. 21.—The Rutherford County Club held its September meeting here Friday at noon in the First Baptist church. This was a joint meeting with the Rutherford County Medical Society. Prof. Clyde A. Erwin, vice president of the club, presided in the

absence of the president, Mr. G. B. Howard.

Rev. I. S. McElroy, pastor of the Rutherfordton Presbyterian church, returned thanks. Nearly forty members of the County Club and Medical Society were present. A very appetizing luncheon was served by the members of the Woman's Missionary Society, of the First Baptist church.

Mr. R. E. Price made an announcement regarding the Armistice Day celebration, which will be held in Rutherfordton on November 11th. He asked the support of the Societies represented, both as clubs and as individuals, in making the celebration a success. On motion of Mr. David Lindsay, the clubs went on record as moral supporters of the celebration.

Mr. O. J. Hoier was called upon to give a report of the trip last month to Greeneville, Tenn., which was sponsored by the club, at which time more than 200 farmers and their families spent a day in Greene county, on a tour of inspection of farms and dairies. Mr. Hoier gave a clear and forceful description of the tour, and what it might ultimately mean to this county.

The program was given in charge of Dr. W. C. Bostic, Sr., president of the Rutherford County Medical Society, who presented several new members of the profession, who are now visiting in the county, or have recently come into the county, including Dr. James Ayers and Dr. Charles Padgett, both of Forest City, Dr. W. C. Bostic, Jr., presented the speaker of the day, Dr. G. Oran Moore, of Charlotte.

After a few preliminary remarks, Dr. Owen announced that instead of talking on some technical subject, he would speak on "Some Outstanding Men of Medical History." For an hour or more he outlined, in a brilliant, forceful manner, the high spots in Dr. Marion Simms' life. Dr. Simms, who was born and reared in Lancaster, S. C., perhaps achieved a reputation in surgery that is unequalled in modern times. His struggles, failures and eventual success was portrayed by a master hand in the speech of Dr. Moore. Due to lack of time the speaker touched briefly on the career of several other noted doctors, among them being Dr. Carroll and Dr. Reed and others.
