# LIEUTENANT WILL **FACE TRIAL NOV. 24**

Lieut. Beck and Two Patrolmen Charged With Assault By Rutherfordton Men.

Rutherfordton, Nov. 16 .- Three warrants were served by Sheriff Mc-Farland Thursday on Lieut. R. H. Beck of Marion, commander of Division E, state highway patrol, who has charge of 22 western North Carolina counties.

One charges him with cursing and using boisterous language on the streets here and was signed by C. Lee Biggerstaff, fire chief and secretary treasurer of Rutherfordton, while two other warrants signed by George R. Hodge charge the lieutenant with parking within three feet of a fire plug in Rutherfordton Wednesday and of assault on affiant while acting as special policeman.
