

FARM DEMONSTRATION AGENTS BEGIN TO BEGIN WORK.

T. L. Blue of Moore County Comes to Scotland As Farm Demonstration Agent.

Mr. T. L. Blue of Carthage, Moore county, arrived in Laurinburg Tuesday and is making preparations for the beginning of his work as county farm demonstration agent.

The county commissioners at their regular meeting the first Monday in July made an appropriation for the farm demonstration work for this county.

Mr. Blue's first work will be to go over the county, getting acquainted with farmers, soil and crop conditions, and learn something of the livestock possibilities and progress here, pastures, orchards, etc.

Mr. Blue is a young man, a native of Moore county, where he was reared on a farm and is acquainted with general crops and soils peculiar to this section.

Later Mr. Blue expects to have an office at Laurinburg—in the court house, if one is available—which shall be a clearing house of information for farmers.

Why Demand Fire Protection in Mills, Factories, Stores, and All Other Grounded Places.

Apart from imposing deficiency charges for the absence of approved fire protection equipment, the rating bureaus have no authority to enforce the observance of their requirements.

MRS. HENRY SMITH'S SON.

The Lady Who Writes to President Wilson Has a Good Deal to Be Thankful For.

New York World. Mrs. Henry Smith of Whamoa, Indiana, writes a letter to President Wilson complaining of the hardship her son was compelled to undergo as a member of the National Guard on duty in Texas.

The President, in his reply, has explained to her that the National Guard is at the border "not for the purpose of a drill, but for the purpose of protecting the country."

If Mrs. Henry Smith were a wise woman she would not be writing to the President bawling the trifling hardships to which her son is obliged to submit as a member of the National Guard.

The hardships to which the National Guard is subjected on the Texas frontier are about equal to the hardships of an ordinary strenuous vacation in the Maine or the Minnesota woods; but war is serious business.

Let her think of the boys lying on the fields with arms blown off, or legs blown off, or faces blown off, perishing in horrible agony for the lack of medical assistance which cannot be given them.

Let her think of the millions of boys in Europe who are not worrying because their boys have to eat rye and bread, but who are worried day and night lest they will never see their boys again alive.

Let her try to visualize the hourly terrors of a war in which 3,000,000 or 10,000,000 men have already been killed or wounded—most of them boys like her boy.

Then let her remember that except for the statesmanship of Woodrow Wilson the body of her own son might be lying today in an unmarked grave in France or in Germany.

There are millions of Mrs. Henry Smiths in this country with boys who would be subject to military duty if the United States went to war.

On account of so many cases of typhoid fever reported, especially in the flooded sections of the State, the State Board of Health is advising the people to boil all drinking water and get vaccinated.

To insure safety against this course of danger, the Board advises that all water that is likely to be polluted from surface drainings be boiled and that all vegetables and fruits that have been washed over by floods be cooked before eaten.

The Board insists upon typhoid vaccination but says to boil all drinking water is perhaps the most immediate safeguard, as infection may get up before the full treatment can be taken and have effect.

Richmond Farmers. Farm Extension News. County Agent Hicks, of Richmond County, writes that during the season there have been planted in his county 200 acres of velvet beans, 300 acres of soybeans and 200 acres of peanuts.

Very little of these crops have been planted heretofore. He states, also, that farmers are planting considerable acreage to corn cobs.

OUR ANNUAL REPORT

According to our usual custom, we have had the second annual examination of our Dairy Herd, the report of which follows. This examination was made by Dr. Alexander of Wadesboro, N. C., a graduate of Ohio State University and a licensed Veterinarian.

August 1, 1916

To whom it may concern:

I, S. A. Alexander, (D. V. M.) have tested for tuberculosis the dairy cattle of the Oakland Dairy, and find them to be free from this disease with two exceptions, only one of which was being milked. S. A. ALEXANDER, D. V. M.

We wish to state that the two animals referred to were young cows that had not been previously subjected to the tuberculin test, one of which was not in lactation at present and the other only about ten days. These two of course have been eliminated, as is customary. This is considered a remarkably good health record for a herd of this size.
