WEEKLY CROP BULLETIN.

Issued by the N. C. Section of the U. S. Department of Agriculture for week ending July 30.

An extremely fortunate change in the weather conditions in North Carolina occurred at the beginning of the week ending Monday, July 30, 1900, and the gloomy apprehension of the farmers were removed by the copious precipitation, which thoroughly broke the drouth through out the State.

Very much old corn was so greatly damaged by drouth that it cannot recover under most favorable conditions, but all late corn appears to have been thoroughly revived and is now promising.
