mination of Company To Develop Farm Lands

New Bern, N. C., Jan. 4 .- Determined to concentrate its energies on the development of its rich agriculhas decided to conclude entirely the operation of its mill here.

This decision marks the conclusion of a gradual decline in production of lumber and shingles which has marked the operation of the Roper company's mills for the past decade. This reduction has meant in the period a greater attention to the development of the company's rich holdings of agricultural lands. With cessation of the operation of the mills concentration can be effected.

Hundreds of men who have been with the Roper Company for long terms of service will go out of employ temporarily. This very fact says an official, is greatly regretted
