THOS. S. MARTIN IS LAID TO REST.

Mr. Thomas S. Martin, one of Beaufort's most highly respected citizens died at his home here last Sunday morning, and after simple services was laid to rest Monday in the Episcopal Cemetery. The funeral services were conducted by Dr. G. W. Lay in the Episcopal Church and were attended by a large number of visiting friends and relatives of the deceased.

Mr. Martin, the son of Dr. and Mrs. Sarah Martin, was born in Beaufort in 1854, being 71 years of age at the time of his death. He served about twenty years in the United States Navy, was a lieutenant in the Spanish American War, and at the time of his death was on the retired list of the Navy, on account of his years of service and on account of injuries received in the service at Charleston, S. C. He and his family have lived in Beaufort for many years and he leaves a large circle of friends who grieve his passing and extend their sympathy to his family.

Mr. Martin's death was sudden and unexpected by those nearest to him. Although retired from active business, he had had comparatively good health for a number of years and was always ready to receive a caller and was frequently seen on the street. He suffered a stroke of paralysis while at home with his daughter last Saturday morning; little hope of recovery was held out and his condition rapidly grew worse until his death Sunday morning.

He is survived by his wife, Mrs. Thomas S. Martin, two daughters, Miss Kathleen Martin and Mrs. West Taylor, a brother, Mr. Ed. Martin, and four sisters, Mrs. Ernest Duncan, Mrs. Warren Whitehurst, Mrs. Samuel M. Buckman and Mrs. E. J. Hopkins.

IMPOSING CATHEDRAL BUILDING AT WASHINGTON

Washington, D. C., June—The National Cathedral being erected at Washington will be, when completed, the most imposing structure erected by the Protestant Episcopal church in this country. It is surrounded by a sixty-seven acre garden, which is becoming one of the beauty spots of the nation. The grounds contain a boxwood hedge sent as a present by Thomas Jefferson to the owner of the estate which once comprised these grounds. Another boxwood to be found there grew from a sprig carried in a cluster of flowers by Dolly Madison at her husband's inauguration. Another boxwood came from a hedge planted by Washington at Hayfield Manor, Va., the plants being set out with slips taken from Mr. Vernon. The baptismal font of the cathedral will be lined with stones taken from the Damascus River, here Jesus was baptised. In the stone work of the cathedral every plant and animal found on the grounds will be carved. When completed the cathedral will cost ten million dollars. It crowns St. Albans Hill, overlooking Washington from the northwest. The remains of President Wilson and Admiral Dewey were recently interred in the crypt of this church. The June number of The Outdoor Pictorial, Washington, contains a beautifully illustrated article describing the National Cathedral and grounds.
