CONSTRUCTION OF FILL FOR ROADWAY.

Bids close October 5, 1925.

Beaufort, N. C. Sealed proposals will be received by the Board of Commissioners for Carteret County at the Court House, Beaufort, N. C., until 2.00 P. M. October 5, 1925 for the construction of a fill for roadway.

The work will consist of about One hundred and seventy five thousand (175,000) cubic yards of fill across marsh land and small creeks between Beaufort, N. C., and Morehead City N. C.
