 ant was convicted. Patrolman Moore also testified that he saw Styron and that he appeared to have been drinking. Police officer Seth Hughes said he smelt liquor but that the defendant did not seem to be drunk. Styron admitted having taken a drink but said he was not drunk and could drive all right. Police officer Iredell Salter, restaurant keeper Nick Dombalis and Chief of Police Willis testified in behalf of Styron stating that when they saw he did not seem to be drunk.

The judgment of the court was that Mr. Styron was guilty. He was let off with the costs and is not to drive a car for sixty days from July 1.

William Ward, a middle aged Negro man, was tried on the charge of having stolen the pocket book of Mrs. Charles Ortlieb of Morehead City. Mrs. Ortlieb testified that when she got out of her car she dropped the pocket book on the running board or the ground, that she saw Ward at the car and saw him stoop down and pick up something. She was corroborated in her statement by J. W. Hill. Chief of Police Willis testified that he helped search Ward and found a bill fold and \$3.85 in his pocket. He said the money smelled like talcum powder. At the conclusion of the evidence Mr. Wheatly moved for a non suit which was denied by the court. He then gave notice of an appeal to Superior Court and Ward was put under a bond of \$100.

Roy Willis, a young white man from the Smyrna neighborhood submitted to a charge of having set fire to woods which damaged 3000 acres of forests. District Warden Hooker and Deputy Warden Clyde Mason testified as to the damage done. There was some evidence that the defendant is weak minded. He testified that he threw a lighted cigarette down and that the fire started and got away from him. The judgment of the court was that the defendant pay a fine of \$15 and costs and that he is to serve 30 days in jail unless he shows good behavior for the next six months.

James Keyes a Negro truck driver of Morehead City was convicted of the charge of simple assault and fined \$5 and costs. The accusation against him was that he assaulted Bertie Murrill a Beaufort woman. It seems that a party of colored people had been joy riding to Playview Beach and Morehead City and that after some dispute Keyes either hit the woman or threatened to do so. The court did not seem to think the affair a very serious matter and let the defendant off with a small fine and costs.

A. A. Garner, disposing of mortgaged property. Matter left open for 60 days to give the defendant a chance to settle the debt.

Stanly Lockhart, selling liquor, called and failed to answer. Capias issued and continued.

George Davis, colored, giving worthless check to Noe Hardware Company. The court stated that the transaction did not come under the provisions of the bad check law and the case was dismissed.

P. R. Lewis, violating bad check law; noli prosequi.

Aleck Becton violating prohibition law and larceny of water melon. Case continued until next Tuesday.

The Texas Company against Beaufort Fuel and Oil Company—non suit. Notice of appeal given.

Laura C. Duncan and Mary E. Benson against the John L. Roper Lumber Co., and Bridgeton Lumber Co. The plaintiff's evidence was heard after which a non suit was ordered. The plaintiff's attorneys gave notice of an appeal.

Mary Sutton by her next friend Annie Stanley against the Winston Mutual Life Ins. Co. The trial resulted in a verdict of \$500 and interest.

E. D. O'Neal against W. W. Jones, W. J. Jones and G. B. Jones. This was a personal injury suit. The defendant was injured by the falling of a wall upon him in the rebuilding of the Morehead City school. He was given a verdict of \$5000.

J. C. Long against B. P. Way motion to set aside judgment denied.

Carter Lee and Coal Co., against B. P. Way. The judgment of referee W. O. Williams in favor of the plaintiff for \$1943.45 was upheld. Appeal was taken.

Board of Trustees of Beaufort Graded School against the County Board of Education. Former order of court was continued. It was construed however as meaning that no person residing within the Beaufort school district has a right to attend the school except upon the terms and conditions prescribed by the Board of Trustees.

Minnie Bell Willis against Harold Lee Willis. The defendant had been required to pay the plaintiff the sum of \$20 a month and had not done it. He was ordered to appear at the October term of court and show that he had complied with the order of the court.

Roy Weber of Iredell County hand picked four acres of Fulcaster wheat to be sure he would have seed wheat available for certification by the North Carolina Crop Improvement Association.

Beaufort County Irish potato growers estimate an average yield of between 30 and 35 barrels an acre this season. This is low for the section.

The dreaded Granville tobacco wilt has appeared in a field near Fountain in Edgemore County.
