## Two N. C. Congressmen Die Within One Week

Asheboro, Sept. 27.—The state and the seventh North Carolina congressional district today mourned William C. Hammer representative in congress, who died suddenly yesterday afternoon.

Heart trouble caused the death of the 65-year-old legislator, doctors said.

From every part of the nation messages of sympathy poured into Mrs. Hammer, the widow, and Mrs. Harriet Hammer Walker, his daughter, the only survivors.

Governor O. Max Gardner, President Herbert Hoover, Congressman John H. Kerr and R. L. Doughton, Senators F. M. Simmons and Lee S. Overman, E. Y. Webb, A. L. Bulwinkle, Josephus Daniels, and scores of others wired their sympathy.

Mr. Hammer's death came just 24 hours after he had attended the funeral in Fayetteville of his friend and colleague, Maj. Charles M. Stedman of the fifth North Carolina district. Major Stedman died Tuesday.

Born in Randolph county where all his life was spent, Mr. Hammer was educated at Western Maryland and the University of North Carolina, he taught school, practiced law, held several city and county offices, was named United States attorney in 1914 and nominated to congress by his party in 1920. His election that year was followed by four re-elections.

## TAX RELIEF IS NOT PROBLEM FOR STATE

Raleigh, Sept. 27.—North Carolinians who are expecting the next general assembly to supply the magic relief from tax burdens and problems are doomed to disappointment, in the opinion of T. Wingate Andrews, superintendent of High Point schools.

Mr. Andrews, a former president of the North Carolina Education association, outlined his views on tax relief in an address here before the Rotary club.

"The slogan in North Carolina," he said, "seems to be 'Run Right to Raleigh when the people want relief from taxes, when they ought to be going to city and county commissioners. Most of the problems didn't originate in Raleigh and they aren't going to be remedied there."
