BOYS PLAN TRIP TO STATE FAIR

Members of the Newport chapter of Young Tar Heel Farmers plan to attend the N. C. State Fair again this year. It has been our pleasure to attend the state fair for the past four years. We believe this trip will not only afford recreation; but will be very educational from an agricultural standpoint.

It is our aim to leave Newport Thursday morning, Oct. 11, at 9:00 a. m. arriving in Raleigh at approximately 1:00 p. m., we will visit all the various state institutions located in this city; spend the night at State College, and attend the Fair Friday. The average cost per boy should not exceed \$1.75, which includes eats, transportation, grandstand and miscellaneous.

County Council Plans Coming Year Program

The County Council of Home Demonstration Clubs held their fall meeting in the Home Agent's office on Tuesday, Oct. 2nd. Twenty-four women attended representing eleven clubs. The purpose of this meeting was to make plans for the Home Demonstration program for the coming year and to discuss plans for Achievement Day which will be held Oct. 30th.

Mr. Archie B. Freeman, representative from the State Board of Health, gave a most interesting and helpful talk on rural sanitation, stressing particularly the importance of sanitary toilets.

The Council voted to have Home Improvement as the major project for the coming year. The topics chosen for each month's program were as follows:

1. Why be Tired?
2. Kitchen Arrangement.
3. Convenient Arrangement of Small Equipment in the Kitchen.
4. Walls and Floors.
5. Comfort in Furnishing.
6. Color in the Home.
7. Window Treatments.
8. Family Co-operation in Work and Play.

The Council voted to have a Flower Show in the spring and an encampment next summer for the Club Women of the county.

At the State Federation meeting in Raleigh on August 4th, the Council voted to undertake a program of Rural Housing Improvement in each county for 1934-35. This program was discussed at the meeting Tuesday, and it was decided that special emphasis would be given the following:

1. Rural Electrification.
2. Improvement of Water Supply.
3. Toilet Facilities.
4. Drainage.
5. Repair of underpinnings, roofs,

walls, doors and windows.

6. Screens.
