MOREHEAD GETS PROCESS PLANT

Coastal City Offers Liberal Inducements For Establishment

Decision to locate the district processing plant of the eastern Carolina Fishermen's Self-Help Cooperative at Morehead City instead of New Bern as first suggested, due to the large concessions offered there, was reached late Thursday afternoon at a meeting of the board of directors of the association held there.

Morehead City and county representatives offered \$10,000 in cash or its equivalent in materials for erection of the proposed plant on a site, also donated, convenient for water rail and highway connections. They promised also to pay for fire, water and tornado damage insurance, and to bear the expense of any taxes that might possibly be levied against the plant. A lease for 99 years was offered at \$1 a year.

After accepting this liberal offer, directors immediately set in motion plans for the early beginning of work on the building, which it is hoped to be able to start within the next month of so. PWA or WPA funds will be sought for labor, while the Morehead City concession will take care of all materials and the association will install the machinery.

This plant will be the central headquarters processing establishment along the coast, with receiving and cooling station; storage and packing facilities. There will be two other receiving and cooling stations, one at Manteo and the other at Southport. A number of small fish sheds will also be built along the coast.

The board of directors held a lengthy session. They drafted an application for chartering the self-help association and this was to be filed during the week-end.

CARTERET LEADING IN OYSTER PLANTING

Carteret county has had 435,530 bushels of oysters planted, the largest planting of any county in the state, it was reported in Raleigh a few days ago, by R. Bruce Etheridge, director of the state department of conservation and development, who said there were 1,008,094 bushels of oysters and shells planted along the

Carolina coast during the past 18 months by the CWA and ERA, at an average cost of 8.2 cents per bushel, or \$82,431.34 for the entire project. The state was the first in the union to adopt this oyster planting work, but other states are now carrying out similar projects.
