May Be Heirs To Millions In England



Gold, And an English Estate May Be Theirs

In last week's edition of The Beaufort News, we reprinted the courtesy of Victor Meekins, and The Dare County Times, an interesting feature story relating to an English fortune which may rightfully belong to certain residents on Hatteras Island. The above is a photo follow-up on the story.

Mrs. Lula Farrow of Frisco (Hatteras Island) stands before the grave of her father who ran away from England at the age of 15 and died at Hatteras at the age of 41. She is shown with her small grand son, Gray Jr. The old homestead in which she lives at Frisco is shown at the bottom. The insert on the right is a closeup of Mrs. Farrow and reveals a woman of strong character and poise, which proves that blood will

tell, and bears witness to the story that her father was a man of hereditary nobility, and a forceful, able and energetic character as his neighbors say he was. Mr. Lyons, father of Mrs. Farrow, and probably the son of nobility died in 1891. Had he lived the little boy shown in the picture, who depends on his grandparents for sustenance, might have been availed of opportunities such as no other child on the coast has ever known. Efforts are being made now to contact legal counselors in England who have a knowledge of this estate. Who knows but what Mrs. Farrow may yet live to enjoy some of the riches that may be hers. 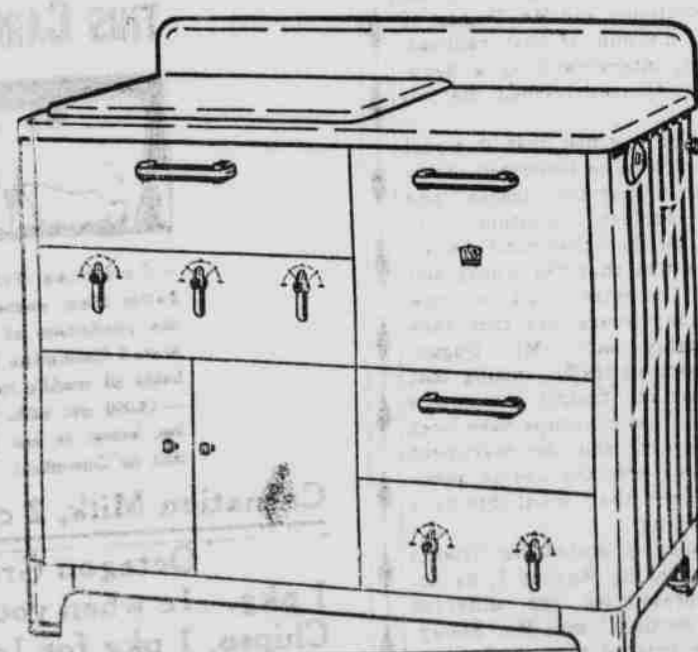

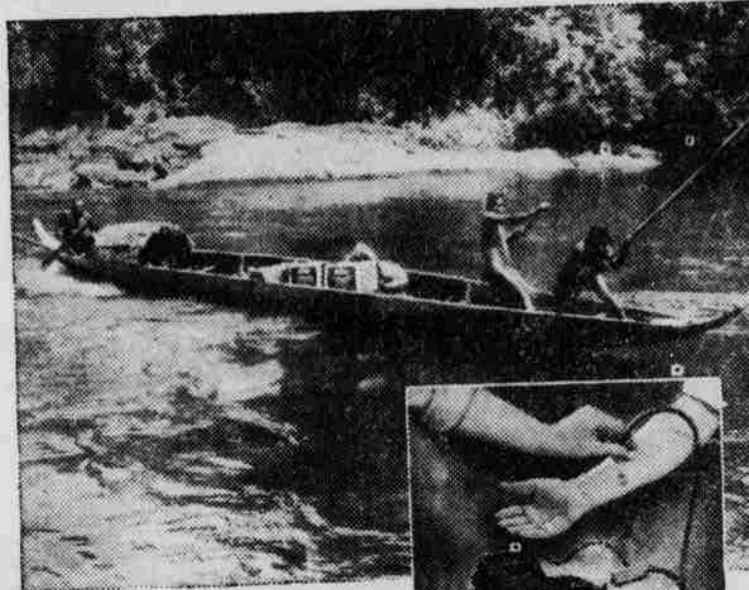
