RULES AND REGULATIONS PASSED AT THE MEETING OF THE DEPARTMENT OF CONSERVATION AND DEVELOPMENT AT MT. MITCHELL, N. C. OCTOBER 22nd-23rd, 1936.

SHELLFISH RULES

Rule No. 17 (Amended) It shall be unlawful to take or catch oysters in Bay River above a line from Pine Tree Point Beacon on the south side of Bay River to the Beacon at the mouth of the Inland Waterway on the north side of Bay River in Pamlico County.

80. It shall be unlawful to take or catch oysters in Core Sound and its tributaries between Hall's Point and Davis' Island; or to take or catch oysters above a line in Harrett's Bay or its tributaries above a line drawn from Wallace's fish factory on the west side to Davis Island on the east side.

81. It shall be unlawful to take or catch oysters in Broad Creek in Carteret County.

82. It shall be unlawful to take or catch oysters in the following territory in Brunswick County: Beginning at Gause Landing to Spider Branch. From Beach landing to mouth of Spider Creek then to Head of Apricot to light 65. Beginning at Quincy Point to Brick Yard Landing Channel. From mouth of eastern channel to Tuckers Cove. From mouth of Gibbs Creek to mouth of Ocean Creek. Beginning at Ocean Creek to mouth of canal east side. From Cotton Patch Landing on east side of channel to Monks Island. From Breakfast Creek to mouth of canal. Beginning at Galloway's landing to Spring Branch. Beginning at Mercer marsh on north side of Holden's Beach Landing.

83. It shall be unlawful to take or catch oysters in the following boundaries in Dare County near Stumps Point: Beginning at a stake 360 yards southeast of Dreen Point and running east 500 yards to a stake; thence south 150 yards to a stake; thence a westerward course to the place of beginning. Beginning at a stake 600 yards northeast of Pine Hammock and running north 400 yards to a stake; thence east 200 yards to a stake; thence south 400 yards to a stake; thence west 200 yards to place of beginning.

84. It shall be unlawful to take or catch oysters in the following boundaries in Dare County near Wanchese: Beginning at a stake 300 yards south of Broad Creek Point and running northeast 500 yards to a stake; thence southeast 900 yards to a stake; thence southwest 500 yards to a stake; thence northwest 900 yards to the

place of beginning. Beginning at a stake on the marsh on the west point of Duck Island running west 200 yards to a stake; thence south 600 yards to a stake; thence east 200 yards to a stake on the marsh; thence the various courses of the shore to the place of beginning. Beginning at a stake on the marsh on the north point of Duck Island and running northeast 200 yards to a stake; thence southeast 900 yards to a stake on the marsh; thence a northwesterly course along the shore to the place of beginning.

85. It shall be unlawful to take or catch oysters in the following boundaries in Dare County near Manto: Beginning at a stake on the shore at a ditch south of Ballast Point and running northeast 250 yards to a stake on the east side of Broad Creek Channel; thence a southeasterly course along the shoal 850 yards to a stake; thence southwest 250 yards to a stake on the shore; thence a northwesterly course along the shore to the place of beginning.

86. It shall be unlawful to take or catch oysters in the following boundaries in Dare County near Kinnakeet: Beginning at a stake bearing north north west from Big Kinnakeet Coast Guard Station and west north west 1-14 miles from Clemmie Gray's fish house on what is known as the Drums Shoal running south south east 500 yards to a stake; thence west south west 400 yards to a stake; thence north northwest 500 yards to a stake; thence east northeast 400 yards to the place of beginning.

87. It shall be unlawful to take or catch oysters in the following territory in New Hanover County Moore's Creek below Bishops Landing. Everette Creek below Pages Landing. Bradley Creek below Metz Landing to the northern point of Money Island. Masonboro Bay below the mouth of Hewlett Creek to Parsley's Landing. Big Bay below the mouth of Luzon Creek to Wire Creek. John's Creek from its mouth to its source.

88. It shall be unlawful to take or catch oysters in the following boundaries in Dare County: Beginning at a stake 200 yards from the west point of what is known as the great

Island at south Rodanthe and running west 300 yards to a stake; thence east 300 yards to a stake thence east 300 yards to a stake; thence south 500 yards to the place of beginning.
