> RULES AND REGULATIONS PASS ED AT THE MEETING OF THE DEPARTMENT OF CONSERVA-TION AND DEVELOPMENT AT MT. MITCHELL, N. C. OCTOBER 22nd-23rd, 1936. SHELLFISH RULES

Rule No. 17 (Amended) It shall be unlawful to take or catch oysterin Bay River above a line from Pine Tree Point Beacon on the south side of Bay River to the Beacon at the mouth of the Inland Waterway on the north side of Bay River in Panilico County.
