Wednesday, Feb. 10 on hand to res-

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ceive films. Tuesday afternoon I received a radiogram stating that the Modoc would reach Beaufort Inlet about 7 p. m. Tuesday and that C. G. 228 commanded by Capt. Tuten would meet her. About 8 o'clock Capt. Tuten called stating that he had contacted the Modoc which had given him a small package to be delivered to me containing films of the distressed Rigel.

GETTING THE films I wrapped same for mailing first class airmail to Atlanta, knowing they would leave Beaufort at 7 o'clock the following morning. They were in the post office ready to roll when Atlanta called stating they believed the AP the a clear scoop on first scenes of any ship in trouble result of the Friday gale. They urged me (it was 10 o'clock by this time) to hire a taxi and take the films to Raleigh in time to catch the southbound plane at 12:30 I told them it was impossible.

THE QUICKEST WAY to get the films to an AP bureau equipped for wire photos was to send them by bus the following morning to Rocky Mount and from there by regular special delivery mail to the Washington bureau, I was informed through one source. That had to suit Atlanta, so they agreed, that it would be best for me to get the films out of the postoffice and reroute them. Finally by midnight I had completed arrangements and early Wednesday morning Driver Tanner of Seashore told me that he would see that films were placed in postoffice at Rocky Mount, by 12:30 o'clock. He kept his word and wired from there the films would reach Washington at 10:45 o'clock. That was two hours and 15 minutes later than the Atlanta Bureau and myself had figured, but it had to be.

THEN ON Wednesday I checked the fastest airmail routes to Washington with Mr. Swann at the post office and discovered that had I mailed the package from here by airmail a plane in Raleigh would have pick-

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ed same up at 6:30 o'clock and had them in Washington by 7:30 o'clock. So next time I have any hot photos for the AP that are worthy of going throughout the country by wire I will know my schedule better.

ALL COASTGUARDSMEN who were on flood duty in the middle west are returning to their posts in stations along the North Carolina coast this week. They bring vivid tales of conditions in the flooded cities where hundreds of thousands were homeless. Ben Garrish, Harvey Wahad and Jesse Babb, picket boat crew of Ocracoke passed through Beaufort today after being in Norfolk for two weeks awaiting orders to proceed to the flood zones. They never received orders, and each seemed rather well pleased that they had not, because the C. G. job out there was no picnic.

OCRACOKE ISLAND'S famous Simie O'Neal is quite sick, according

to reports reaching here. He recently returned to the island from Washington where he was in a hospital. Simie has friends all over the country who will regret to learn that he is ill. . . . And last week Walter Howard arrived here from Ocracoke where he had been operating a tavern for the past several months saying that he never expected to return to the island again and that "Ocracoke aint what it used to be." Walter Howard for many years was prominent in Broadway "hill-billy" music circles.
