PORT OFLICIALS ARE REELECTED

Royal Retained As Chairman Of Commission, Crewell as Managing Director

Dr. B. F. Royal, prominent Morehead City surgeon, was reelected chairman of the Morehead City Port Commission at a meeting of the organization here.

No changes were made in the personnel of the commission with the exception of Walter P. Freeman being named treasurer, an office form erly held by George R. Wallace. Wallace still retains the secretariel post.

Other officers elected were: Stanley Woodland, vice president; H. P. Crowell, managing director; W. M. Dutton, general auditor, and E. W. Dozier, traffic manager.

Election of the officials followed the apponitment of members of the commission, four of whom are appointed by the Governor and three by the city.

State appointees are Dr. B. F. Royal and H. P. Crowell, Morehead City; L. H. Harvey, Kinston, and J. Y. Monk, Farmville. City appointees are Stanley Woodland, Walter Hufham and G. R. Wallace.

Crowell also is president of Atlantic and North Carolina rairroad, Dutton and Dozier also are officials

of the railroad. Since Crowell's appointment the port has shown remarkable growth, handling thousands of tons of scrap iron fro shipment to Japan in addition to other cargoes.

In a public statement recently, Mr. Crowell said he expected the metal shipments to continue probably another year, maintaining the inflow of revenue which the new \$2,000,000 port has needed badly since beginning of operation the latter part of last summer.


