Crowell Heads R. R.

An Associated Press dispatch under a Raleigh dateline on July 7 indicated that the corporation has 317 shares of authorized stock of \$50 par value each, with \$4,000 paid in. H. P. Crowell president of the organization owns two shares of the stock. Other stockholders and shares subscribed for are: Stanley Woodland, Morehead City, 10; and at Beaufort, R. W. Safrit, 12; C. R. Wheatly, 12; J. F. Duncan 12; W. V. B. Potter, 12; and George J. Brooks, 257.

At the meeting on Wednesday when Crowell was elected president, Capt. Brooks was elected vice-president; Stanley Woodland, secretary and treasurer and J. F. Duncan, attorney. The board of directors include Crowell, Woodland, Brooks, Safrit Wheatly, and Potter.

Last April the Interstate Commerce Commission following three hearings in the matter granted the Norfolk Southern permission to abandon operation over the trackage within a period of 90 days. The 90 days expired on July 6, according to Director C. R. Wheatly. Anticipating the forming of the corporation, the tariffs over the carrier were re-instated on June 29, he stated.

Arrangements have been made with the Atlantic and North Carolina to operate trains over the recently purchased trackage, it was stated. The service will be the same as it has been in the past.

In Raleigh last night Stanley Winborne, Utilities Commissioner said that he was of the opinion the Beaufort and Morehead City Railroad Company's 'lease' of the 3-17 miles of line between Beaufort and Morehead City from the Norfolk Southern carried with it the I. C. C.'s franchise permitting operation. Despite the severance of connections with the interstate Norfolk-Southern, Commissioner Winborne, is of the opinion the short sector will remain under the supervision of the ICC by virtue of the fact that it will handle freight going to and from other states.

From Norfolk came the report that the matter would be laid before the Receivership Court there for approval of the lease, and that the case would probably come before Federal Court L. B. Way, who is not holding court this week because of minor injuries. In such a case it was stated, resumption of operation on the rail sector awaits only the sanction of the receivership court.

Here in Beaufort it was not stated what proposed changes were planned for the operating personnel of the trackage.

harbor. It all proves that Carteret has been and still is, a sportsman's paradise.

A FIVE AND a half pound big mouth black bass is a good sized fish. But that is what the one taken by Overton Price in a tributary of South River in Mrs. Yeatman's Open Grounds weighed a few days ago, landed with rod and reel the big fresh water bass gave Price plenty of action before it was brought to the landing net. It is one of the largest of the species taken in that section in some time and might even be a record breaker. The foregoing is written only with the thought in of convincing anglers that her in Carteret we have a variety of game fishing...not only in our sound and ocean waters but in our fresh water streams.

A READER OF The Beaufort News, who seemed to know what he was talking about dropped by and said that, the editorial we published about dogs biting children, contained some sentences in which he did not agree. A vaccinated dog can be a rabies carrier, he said, and eminent men of science have proven this during recent years. However a vaccinated dog in all probabilities is much safer than one which has not been given treatment, he agreed. The main thought we had when the editorial was written was to impress owners to keep their dogs from running at large during the summer season. There should be a law prohibiting owners to allow their dogs to run at large. Here in Beaufort the situation is bad. One Negro man we know by sight is always seen with a pack

of dogs following along behind. It is a safe bet that he has not paid licenses on the dogs if he owns same, and a safer bet that none have been vaccinated against rabies. Such a situation should not be tolerated.

SOMETHING We sent to The News and Observer, but overlooked writing up for The Beaufort News was the story about the 9-foot alligator killed out in the Open Grounds recently by Frank King, Harry Mason and Jimmie Grazier, employees of Miss Yeatman, who owns the vast acreage out there. They killed the reptile with an axe and that in itself is somewhat of a feat...even if the gator had been only a few feet in length.
