The very serious matter of the unemployed in England came up for discussion in the House of Commons a few days ago for a larger dose of money than last year and the expediting of the naval ship-building programme were the only expedients proposed by premier Asquith in his unfolding of the government's plan to meet the situation.

The premier made also a bid for recruits, saying that the war office was ready to take on 24,000 men for winter training in the special reserves.
