A Letter on Good Roads.

Mebane, N. C., Nov. 16, '08. Editor Dispatch:

Your offer to give the columns of your paper for a discussion of the road question is a good one and the people of Alamance county should take advantage of it. As this road question is the most important question before our people today. Now I take it that the Board of County Commissioners and the Highway Commissioners, all of whom are honorable men and have the best interest of the entire county at heart, would be glad to know the wishes of the people, and I am sure that every suggestion, no matter where or whom from, will receive careful consideration.

In the first place, every speaker that was sent out by the good road clubs, told the people that not one cent of the bond issue would be spent in any incorporated town. I now learn that an effort is being made by some of the citizens of our town to induce the Highway Commissioners to macadamize the principal streets through the towns. I would be pleased to have the county macadamize the Main street of the town of Mebane, but this would be in violation of the promises made to the people of Alamance county, and I do not believe that there is a single member of the Highway Commission or Board of County Commissioners who will for a moment consider this proposition, and they should not. I learn that the engineers are now at work sur-

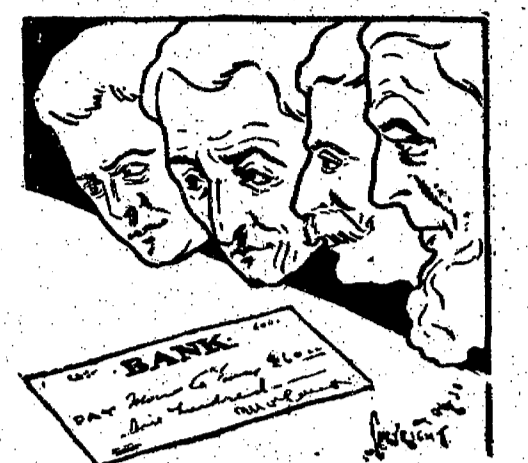

"Old Fashioned Quilting."

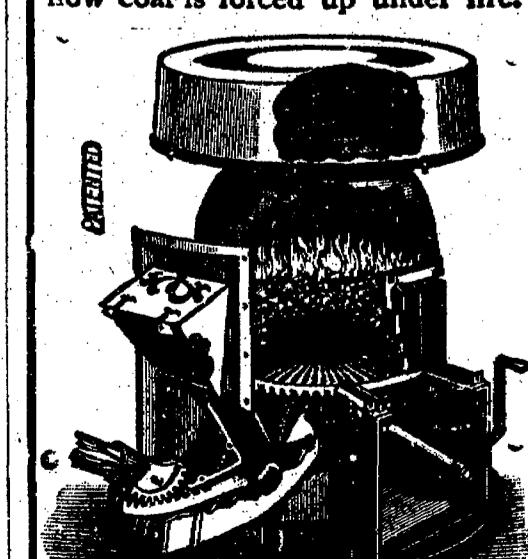
