## OUR BIG BATTLE SHIP.

Has the Permanency of Dreadnought Type Been Established.

Boston Transcript.

Battle-ship dimensions have increased wonderfully in the last twenty years. When we began to build battle ships for "the new navy" under the scheme authorized by the Harrison administration, 10,000 tons was the displacement of a goodly vessel. Now we are building Dreadnoughts of double this displacement. Rapidly; however, as war ship displacement has increased, it has not kept pace with the displacement of ocean liners. There are many great passenger-carrying vessels to-day which displace far more water than any war ship building or afloat. As the merchant vessels have great earning properties, while the war ship is nonproductive, governments have not sought to approach, much less duplicate, 40,000 tonners. A proposal to do it is not as yet economically defensible. No administration here or abroad would think of asking for the funds required to build a 40,000-ton battleship, but who shall say that if the naval madness gathers volume from popular approval, building programme will not reflect an ambition to equal the achievements of the commercial builders?

If they do, the biggest present Dreadnought will be but a second-class ship, and relegated to secondary importance, will be a standing argument for bigger navies of bigger ships. Assuming, however, that battle ships are, as a class, kept at their present proportions, is it certain that effectiveness cannot be increased without increasing dimensions? May not the development of gun powder make such advances as to give to a vessel even smaller than a Dreadnought an offensive force adequate to the emergencies that type was evolved to meet? The great ships of one decade become the moderate ships of its successor, and more than once in our history we have with profit waited for other nations to work out the competitions between types, and adopted the survivor. There is no apparent crisis that should justify us in lavishing scores of millions on Dreadnoughts now, while the permanency of that type remains to be established.

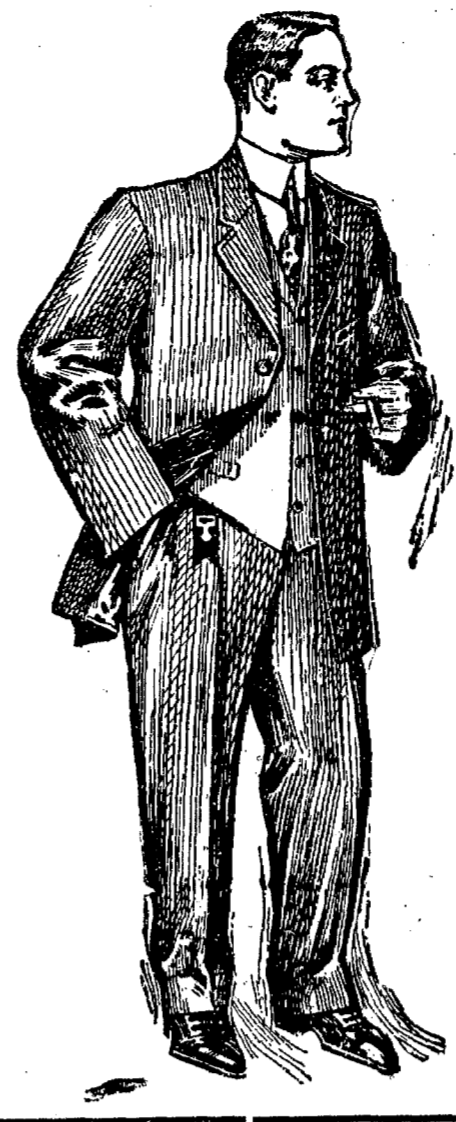
