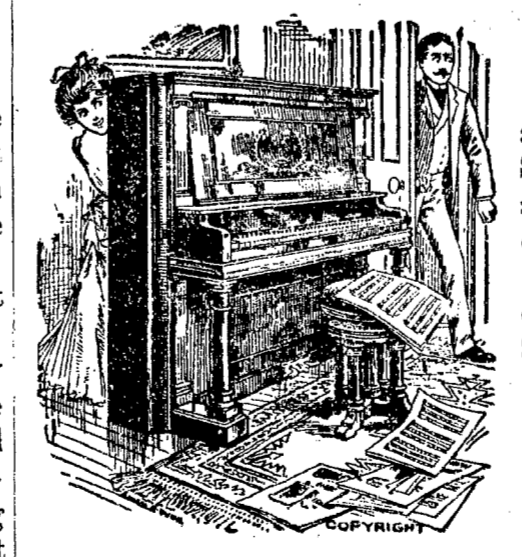

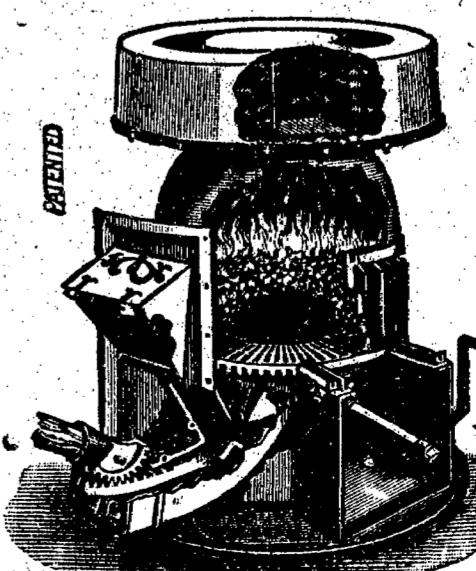
Congress met Monday in a brief session, but both house and senate were quickly adjourned in honor of those who had died in the last meeting.
