The middle or latter part of March should see everything settled and the selected and commissioned enumerators will be sent more circulars and books of instructions relative to the interpretation or meaning of the questions on the two schedules.

"April 15. the Census Army will move forward in the enumeration. "Certainly the Federal Census-taking is as necessary and as honorable as jury duty, and, as all good and useful citizens do not hesitate to respond to the call for such duty, I therefore ask the same high-grade citizenship to come forward and help me have the census taken accurately and expeditiously.

"As President Taft has said, the pay is not large but the work is worth doing well and some day we shall all feel proud in the consciousness that we had a part, however humble, in taking this Census."
