CHURCH COULD TAKE LESSON FROM POLITICAL PARTIES

There is Less Dissatisfaction in Political Ranks Declares Director Allen.

In the States there over one hundred and fifty distinct church bodies, ranging in membership from eight souls to eleven million, asserts William H. Allen, Director of Bureau of Municipal Research in THE DELINEATOR for March. Only thirteen have a member of over five hundred thousand, and only thirty-two a membership of over one hundred thousand. No one church speaks for more than one-third of the total membership of all churches, while all church bodies combined claim only three-eighths of our population. The only unifying force among all churches is a religious motive that all churches, each church, the church, get from society—from human need.

The church, then, can not take action as a unified whole. We must learn to consider the church as made up of a large number of churches. Each church, in turn, is made up of edifice, services, minister, communicants, attendants, not-yet-communicants, not-yet-attendants and surrounding community. In executing any remedy for social unrest the church must work through churches, and these again through the above mentioned component elements in each community.

At the Presidential election of 1908 fifteen million adults were able, amicably, to express their differences through only five national parties. Yet the church requires one hundred and fifty-odd parties to compass the religious differences of a much smaller number of male adults. Within any religious denomination there is probably more dissatisfaction and less agreement than within any political party. Until the church sees the beam in its own eye, how can it hope to locate the mote in society's?
