This great strike in Philadelphia has been so wasteful and miserable an affair from many standpoints that it ought to stimulate thoughtful people in every State of the Union to make advance provision against similar failures of civilization in their own cities. The public authori-

ties of Pennsylvania have been diffculties. They have had so much misery in that State from industrial warfare in years past that they ought to have learned peaceful ways to adjust labor disputes. Both State and city have had heavy bills to pay in their attempts to protect life and property. The street railroad company will have lost much more than it can ever gain through its failure to deal with its own men in such a way as to keep their loyalty.
