Washington Notes.

Washington, D. C., July 10, 1911.—The intense heat that has spread over the country this summer has had effect of checking some of the debate in the Senate on the reciprocity bill. It is now believed that the bill will be finally passed by Aug. 1st, which President Taft will promptly sign, and thus our trade with Canada will spread and develop, thus adding to the prosperity of both countries.
Congress has decided to make an investigation of the business of the great Express Companies with a view to establishing a parcel post in connection with the post office department. The Express Companies have filed new rates with the Interstate Commerce Commission, greatly reducing the former rates of transportation. This shows that they are afraid of a parcel post. Congressmen and Senators have been receiving many strong letters from their constituents from all parts of the country urging them to pass the parcel post bill, and it is not believed that it will be very much longer before such will be done. We are far behind European countries which have had parcel posts for many years.

263 Horses Burn.

Fire of unknown origin early Sunday destroyed the stables of the Arthur W. Dixon Transfer Company, of Chicago, burned two hundred and sixty-three horses to death and caused \$500,000 damages. Scores of firemen narrowly escaped death when the roof caved in.

Fire this Sunday afternoon destroyed the furniture warehouse of the W. C. Reebie & Bros., causing \$100,000 damage. Hot weather made the work of the firemen doubly burdensome.
