The writer of the Oakdale Dots a few weeks ago hit the nail squarely on the head and spoke the sentiments of "the live-out-of-town" people on the road question. We are, it seems only remembered at office hunting and tax paying times. Strange indeed that we are never forgotten at those times but it is a solid fact that we never are. And yet we have been paying our taxes as freely we are sure as our brothers who have been receiving something in return. Our roads here in South Alamance show but little in return for all the road money we have paid. There has been some work done on them yes but not enough. One road I have in mind that has been sadly neglected and one that could be made one of the best dirt roads with but a little care and attention, the old Salisbury road beginning at W. D. Adams on by W. B. Daffron's and Oakdale Graded School to N. A. Kime's Store. This road as a prominent business man remarked has had as little work done on it as any and yet is better than many that have got their share. Because much of the road is good naturally why jump the bad part of it why not make it good all along since it would take but little time and attention to fix it properly once and once fixed would not be expensive to keep in good condition. There are places on this road and several others that I know of that the side ditch is in the middle of the road, places where there is not room for one vehicle to pass another, and tree-tops meeting overhead so it is almost impossible to pass along with a load of cotton hay etc. Now we did not just pay a part of our road tax money but all of it? And we hear there is some being demanded again this year. What are you going to do with it we would like to know where it is going before we pay. Put it around town also? We do not deny but that the roads are good—fine in and around town but since we happen to live in the country, we are benefited but little for their being good there since we have to wear our vehicles team and selves out upon the roads around in the country trying to get something to carry to town to get enough money to pay our road tax with. It always takes about all we can get our hands on for that so we have little left for our own selves but there is no doubt but that we can ride when we get in sight of town and yes until we get out of sight and then—we have to walk the rest of the way home to keep from being launched into a mud-hole but we finally home, tired but happy in the thought that by taking enough such trips we will accumulate enough funds to procure a road-tax receipt and we are very thankful indeed that we did not have to walk all the way. Now there is no justice none at all in the division of the road money, if our roads cannot receive the proper work and attention, don't ask us for tax for somebody else to enjoy. Give it to em Oakdale brother, again.

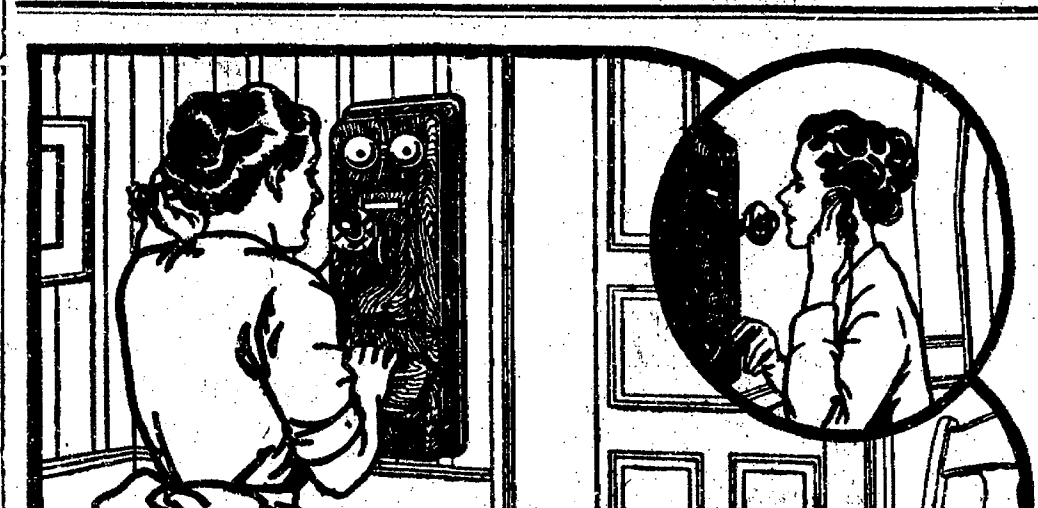
